## Queen's Park Report

**What do you think?**  
The great debate about trading stamps flared anew last week when the Attorney-General informed the Provincial Assembly that the Government is considering legislation to ban the distribution of such stamps by food stores in Ontario.  
Members that I have polled in the House seem evenly divided on this subject.  
The main argument against these stamps is that they are a promotional gimmick which adds to the cost of food and groceries; that if a consumer does not use them, he or she is paying extra for something unnecessarily, and further, it encourages the housewife to concentrate on a camera or can-opener instead of price and quality. Other arguments are that such promotion does not increase the consumption of any particular brand or product, doesn't help the farmer and primary producer, and finally, that many such gimmicks are operated illegally.  
Those who are opposed to legislation banning trading stamps or are indifferent about it feel that a consumer should have the right to make a choice, that not all stores give stamps, and that there will be no pain, if that is not true. Tell him that any pain he may feel now is to save him more pain later on, and this treatment is to help him get better. **SAVING PAIN**  
When a child must enter hospital, he should be prepared for the event. **Will just fill home for aged then begin plans for new one**  
As soon as Halton's new home for the aged citizens, Martin House, adjoining the present Halton Centennial Manor in Milton is filled, the board plans to sit down and begin planning the next one. This announcement came from Manor Board member Herb Merry at Monday evening's meeting of Oakville council. Giving a report on the Manor progress to fellow councillors, the Reeve noted there was already a waiting list of 40 people desperate to enter the new 150-bed facility.  
Reeve Merry noted construction delays were finally overcome. The called Milton an "un-gettable place" and said builders don't seem to want to work there, and furniture should be moved in during the latter part of March. First patients are expected to enter the building in April.  
"The next home should be on the borders of Oakville and Burlington" so it would be closer to the county's centre of population, he added.
