Two arrests

Police recover Ski-Doo's

During the period Feb. 26 to Mar. 4 inclusive, personnel of the Milton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 881 1/2 hours and patrolled a total of 7,017 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol, 24 traffic charges were preferred and 54 traffic violation warnings were issued, as well as 39 convictions registered.

During this period, six property damage accidents and two injury accidents were investigated, resulting in two persons being injured and approximately \$3,355 in property damage. Causes of accidents were "careless driving", "inattentive driving", "rules of the road" and road conditions.

There were 22 general occurrences reported, including break, enter and theft at Hickson Shell Station, Seventh Line, Esqueving Twp., when two cartons of cigarettes were

stolen; theft of gasoline from a truck at the Milton Brick Co.; theft of battery from Green's Esso Service Station at Campbellville; theft of Ski-Doo's, the property of Gordon Preston of Glen Williams and of Thomas McGlashan of R.R. 1, Georgetown, (the Ski-Doo's have been recovered, and two persons have been arrested in this connection); one assault; one other criminal code offence; one liquor seizure resulting in one charge under the Liquor Control Act; one other liquor offence resulting in three persons being charged under the Liquor Control Act; one request for assistance; and one prisoner escort. The remaining occurrences were of a minor nature.

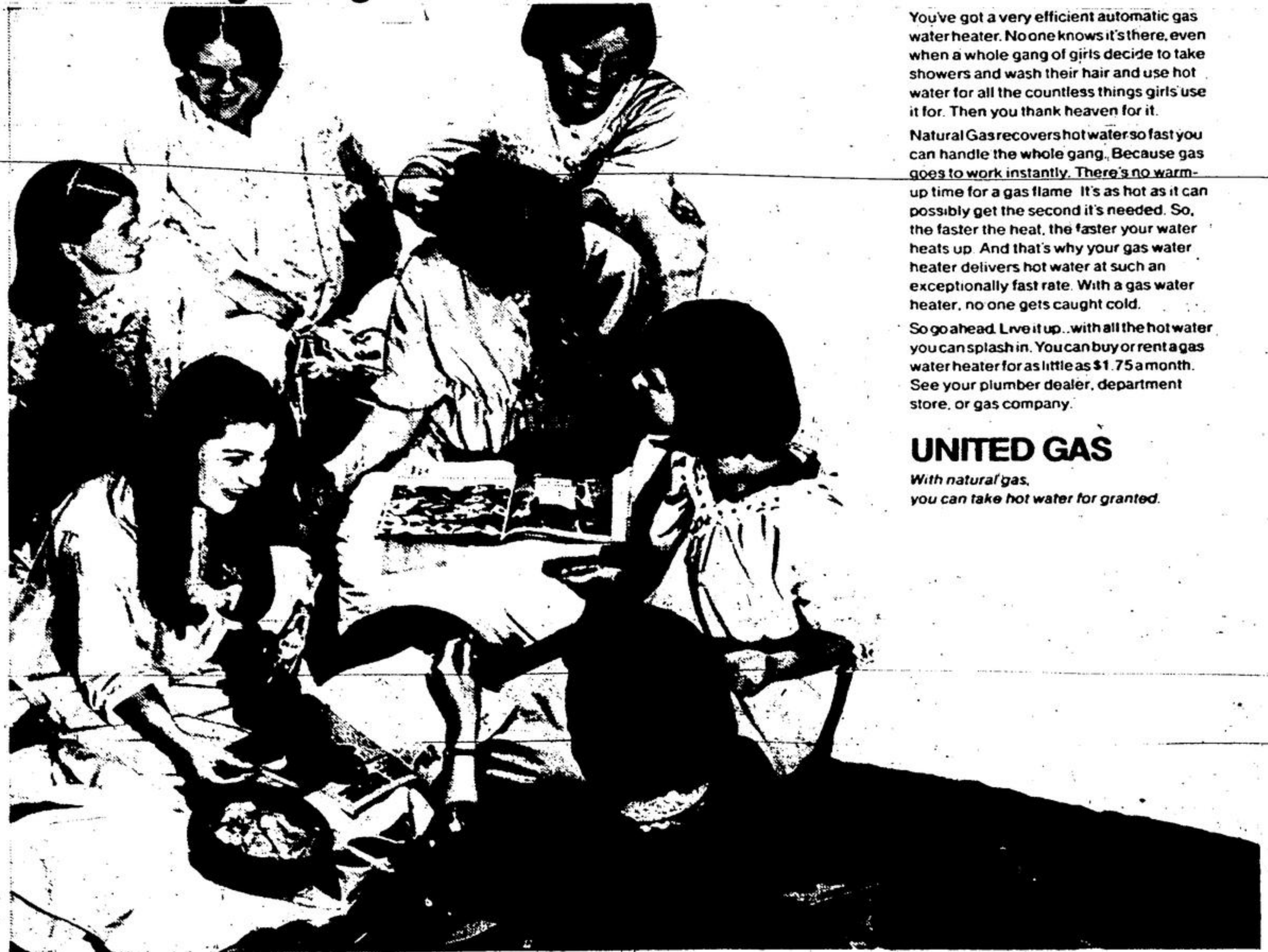
Safety Officer, Prov. Const. W. F. Joyce, showed a safety film and gave four safety lectures to 105 students at the Brookville school during the past week.
