The meeting closed with the Mizpah Benediction and a social half hour was spent over a delightful lunch.

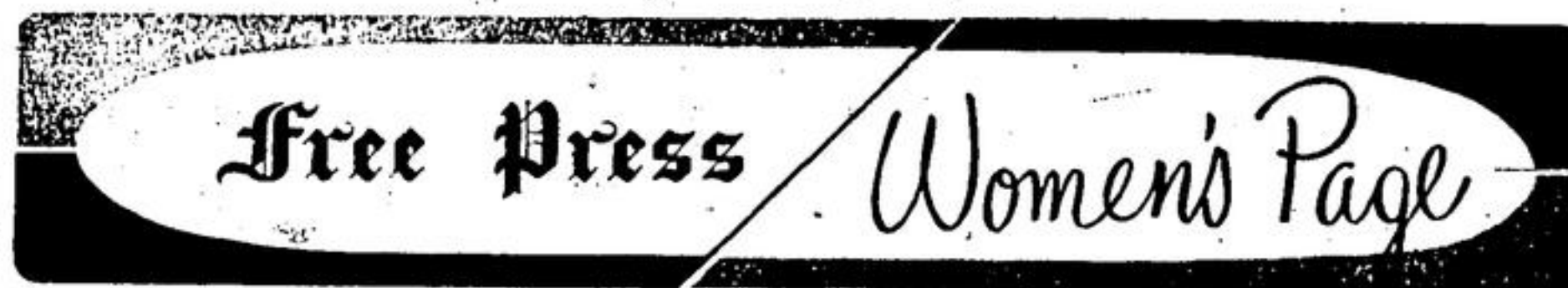
