Hydro commission chairman Ted Tyler Sr. outlined a plan to update services in Acton homes at last Thursday's regular meeting of the commis-

Sponsored by Ontario Hydro and endorsed in a motion by the local commission, the plan will enable owners of homes with small services to borrow money, at bank interest rates, from Ontario Hydro to install new services. Permanent appliances will also be included in the plan, including cost of carpentry and other repairs
