Students can qualify for one year by picking up a form from their Safeco agent and having the school certify the qualifications. Students must requalify each year. If there is more than one teenage boy in a family they must all qualify."

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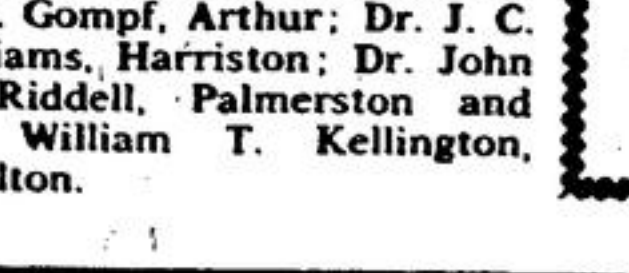
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Hold ceremony for new kitchen

Add 130 phones to exchange annual report records growth

Bell Canada's annual report for 1966, issued this week, shows that the company made unprecedented history in terms of the number of customers and shareholders, and in revenues, expenses, taxes, payroll and capital investment than in any other year in its 86 year history.

A company spokesman said that the most outstanding local reflection of these significant developments was that 130 telephones were added to the Acton exchange.

He added that this growth in telephones here has been repeated in nearly all Bell Canada exchanges. "During the year," he said, "nearly 300,000 telephones were added to our network, making a total of 4,868,392 telephones now served by Bell Canada in its operating territory of Ontario and Quebec.

The report, now being mailed to the company's more than 250,000 shareholders, contains details of significant developments accomplished during the past year, which may exceed all those previously achieved in the company's history.

Included are accounts of the company's preparations

for testing satellite communications, the operational testing of Canada's first electronic switching centre, its participation in Canada's largest industrial research and development program, its Centennial Fellowship program for post-graduate students, and details of the company's greatest year of growth on record.

The report shows that Bell Canada's 1966 construction program amounted to \$293 million, \$50 million more than 1965.

During the year, the company's number of employees increased by 1,600, so that as of last December 31, the total number of Bell Canada employees was 40,000. Payroll figures rose by 12.6 per cent to \$225 million and taxes paid to federal, provincial and municipal governments added up to \$114 million, an increase of more than \$8 million on that for 1965.

This means that for every telephone in service during the past year, the company paid \$24.28 in taxes.

At the end of the year, the company's total telephones in service was 4,868,392, and of this figure, 290,000 were added to the network during the

year. Long distance calling also rose to a new high in 1966, increasing by 5.4 per cent to an average of 565,000 calls daily.
