

Holy Week services extended include Good Friday morning

The ecumenical Holy Week Services are being held this week on three evenings and on Good Friday morning. Again this year the Ministerial Association planned the special series of services for participating congregations.

Guest preacher is Dr. Crawford Smith of Guelph, who has for many years exercised a radio ministry over the Guelph radio station.

All the services are in Trinity United Church, with different pastors, choirs and organists each evening.

The first service on Sunday evening was especially well-attended, many coming together in groups.

Providing leadership in worship were Rev. R. MacMurray

and Rev. D. I. Engel. Mrs. Frank Oakes played the organ and the Anglican church choir under her direction sang "Jesus Lover of My Soul".

On Tuesday evening Ted Hansen played the organ and the young girls from Knox

church choir sang "The Palms". Rev. S. Gammon and Rev. S. Thoman conducted the service.

The third service is Thursday (tomorrow) when the Rev. A. H. McKenzie and Rev. D. Engel will direct the wor-

ship. The United church junior and senior choirs will sing under the director of George Elliott. The anthems are "Go Not Far from Me" and "The Earth is the Lord's."

In addition to the three regular evening services, the Ministerial Association added for the first time as a joint project a Good Friday morning service. This service will begin at 10:30 a.m. and will be arranged for personal meditation. Some of the participating churches have regularly held a Good Friday service in their own church, but for others it is an innovation.

Ushering in by men of the participating congregations, Presbyterian, Anglican, United, Baptist and Pentecostal, (There is presently no local minister for the Christian Reformed church.)

The offering is directed to interdenominational projects selected by the Ministerial Association.

Attending together Sunday evening were town council, Lakeside and Duke of Devonshire chapters of the I.O.D.E., Firefighters, Y's Menettes, Knox Ladies' Aid, Knox Afternoon W.M.S., Legion 197, and the Golden Age Club, and on Tuesday the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Legion, Crusaders from the Pentecostal Church, Brownies and Guides, Knox Alert Evening Auxiliary and Knox board of managers.

Thursday evening the Heather Club of Knox, Baptist B.H.F. and Baptist deacons are expected to come together.

Rev. Gordon Turner new United minister

New minister of Trinity United Church, replacing the Rev. Dwight Engel, is the Rev. Gordon B. Turner, B.A., B.D., of Mattawa. The call becomes effective July 1.

During the months of April, May and June, John A. May, B.A., will be supplying the pulpit. The Engels are moving to Orillia on Wednesday next week, and Mr. May will take his first service here April 2.

Mr. Turner brings wide experience to his new charge. He received his B.A. degree from Mount Allison University, New Brunswick, after majoring in psychology and sociology in 1960. He was in business in Montreal, and was a lay chaplain and student counselor at the Juvenile Training School for Quebec. He began his studies for the ministry from Mount Royal United Church, Montreal.

While studying at Emman-

uel he was student assistant at Woodgreen United Church, Regent Park United Church, and Metropolitan United Church, Toronto.

At Mattawa he had a three point charge, Eau Claire, Brule - Rutherglen.

His wife is a graduate nurse from London, and they have a four month old baby.

Mr. and Mrs. May will move temporarily into the manse next week with their three month old daughter. Mr. May became a candidate for the ministry during Mr. Engel's pastorate in Capreol, and Mr. Engel will take part in the service when he is ordained in Kitchener on May 31.

Mrs. May comes from Odesa near Kingston, taught commercial subjects in high school and took a year's training in church work in Covenant College. Mr. May has just completed his theology courses at Emmanuel College in Toronto.

An ardent lover of music, he played drums in the Doris Orchestra which has played hundreds of dance engagements in this district.

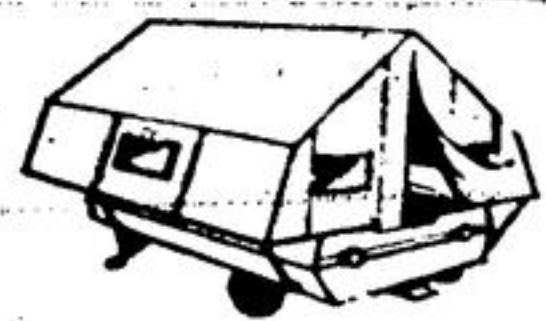

Holy week ceremonies start Thursday St. Joseph's

Holy week ceremonies at St. Joseph's church follow the penitential disciplines of Lent. Altars are draped in purple cloths and the austerity of the church will not change until Easter Sunday, when the feast of Easter will be celebrated with a transformed sanctuary, bedecked with flowers.

The anniversary of the first Mass celebrated in the upper room will be commemorated on Holy Thursday at 8 p.m. when pastor Rev. Father V. J. Morgan celebrates Mass.

Good Friday ceremonies will start at 3 p.m. and Holy Com-

munion will be given. The stations of the cross, an enactment of the trial and execution of Jesus, will be held in the evening at 7:30.

Ceremonies on Holy Saturday begin at 8 p.m., followed by Mass.

The feast of Easter, most glorious in the church year, will be celebrated with Masses at 9 a.m. and 10:30 a.m.
