For years Canada's sports enthusiasts have been trying to sell Canada as an ideal location for the Olympics. It took a young man named Jim Daly and a contingent of Manitoba's provincial and civic officials to make a successful pitch for the Pan-Am Games in Sao Paulo, Brazil, back in 1963.

At that time, delegates were impressed with the group's description of the facilities offered in Winnipeg. They offered a first class arena and stadium to match, excellent quarters for athletes, and waterways for aquatic events.

A full Pan-Am program calls for more than 400 events in such activities as track and field, baseball, basketball, boxing, judo, field hockey, weight lifting and wrestling.

Winnipeg stands to benefit not only from the influx of contestants and spectators, but the legacy of the Pan-Am games is a two million dollar swimming pool, two new stadiums and improved facilities for tennis, shooting and rowing.

Thirty-three countries are eligible for the Pan-American games and it is said Winnipeg is already anticipating the invasion of more than 3,500 athletes.
