Eye safety is necessary

In Canada, about 100,000 persons over 40 suffer from glaucoma. To avoid becoming among the two per cent of our population with glaucoma, eye specialists recommend a tonometer test every two years.

This safe, fast, painless test measures eye pressure. Glaucoma is characterized by increased fluid pressure within the eyeball, which interferes with the health of the blood vessels and nerve fibres.

There are two types of glaucoma—acute and chronic. The acute type strikes suddenly, inflicting cloudy vision, with or without severe pain in and around the eyes.

The chronic type is ten times as common as acute glaucoma. Because it works slowly and painlessly, and may occur without any symptoms noticeable to the patient, it is often called the "sight sneak". Chronic glaucoma, if caught early enough, can be treated successfully by the daily use of eye drops.

In its later stages, the chance of controlling glaucoma and preventing further visual loss is lessened.

Public school board tax levy reduced

Although the proposed budget submitted to council has increased expenditures of over \$21,000, Acton public school board estimates their tax levy for 1967 will be \$4,187 less than last year necessitating no increase in the mill rate.

Main jump in the budget is for instruction. It rose from \$167,884 in 1966 to \$208,200. A

surplus of \$17,700 exists from 1966.

The tax levy of \$157,470 includes the amount of \$52,220 for debentures. With debenture charges erased the figure would be \$105,250 for plant operation. Tax levy last year was \$107,722.

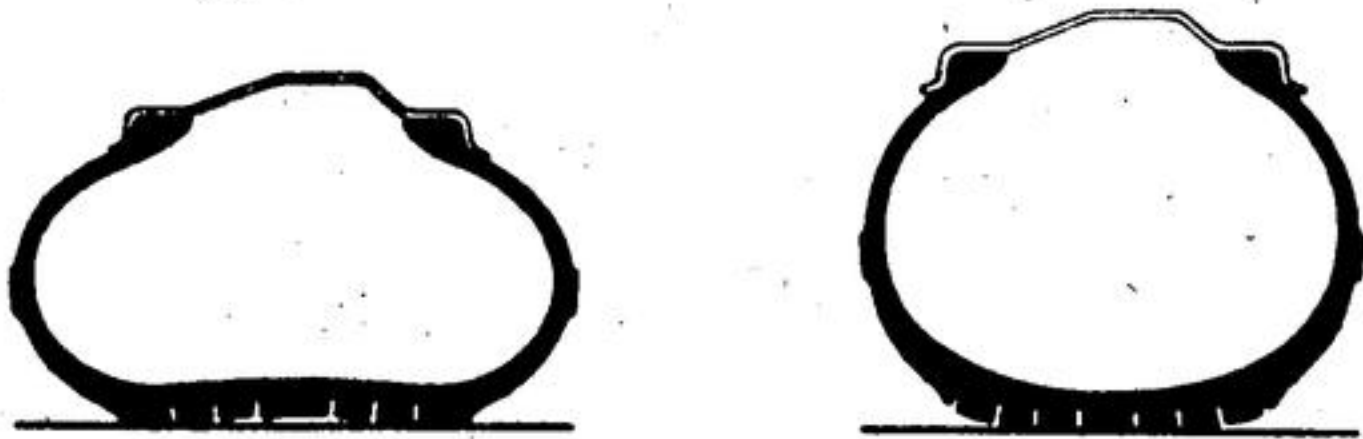
The overall budget figure which includes grants of \$173,000, tuition fees of \$2,550 and non-resident fees of \$1,000 is \$351,720.

Proper inflation is vital to tire safety. An underinflated tire (left) causes extreme flexing and builds up excessive heat, running the risk of failure. It also causes rapid wear on the outer edges. Overinflation (right) makes tires run hard and may cause impact damage, weakening of the carcass and excessive wear in the centre. Either underinflation or overinflation results in improper contact with the road.

"Quack cures" can't help you

Fear of surgery can drive cataract sufferers into the hands of quacks. These quack "cures" or "miracle" drops, exercise, electric gadgets or home surgery may cause the eventual loss of sight. One quack has been known to show a dried split pea and claim this was a cataract lens he had removed from his victim.

Cataract is not a film growing over the lens, but a change or clouding in the lens of the eye itself which blocks the normal passage of light rays through the pupil to the retina—the light-sensitive tissue in the back of the eye.

Cataracts are not infectious or contagious. They are not caused by using the eyes for reading, sewing, TV or movies.

Cataracts can occur at any age, but most are found in the eyes of older people. The cause of these "senile" cataracts in persons over 55 is not known.

Today, patients no longer have to wait for a cataract to "ripen" before corrective surgery. Delay on the patient's part to submit to a safe and effective cataract operation could make the removal of an "over-ripe" cataract difficult.
