

Here is a hand which may illustrate this point. The dealer is West and North - South are vulnerable. North

Pass 1 11 Pass Rdble 2H Pass 3NT All Pass The bidding is very interesting. South makes a take-out double of East's opening heart bid. North, with good hearts, thinks that one heart can be

defeated with a trump lead, so he elects to pass. East's redouble is called a rescue redouble. It asks partner to please rescue to another suit. When West bids diamonds. North shows a good

heart suit. A good three no trump contract is reached. West leads the heart jack and dummy is spread. Declarer must be careful not to lose two hearts, one spade and two diamonds. If East gains the lead too often, he can lead diamonds and get two diamonds for the defense. West is the safe defender, whereas East is

dangerous. In spite of the nice hearts in dummy, declarer should duck the opening heart lead and permit West to win the trick. East cannot afford to play the ace. Now declarer is safe.

If West continues hearts, declarer, covers and sets up three heart tricks. If West

if West leads a diamond. South should be able to make

an overtrick. Notice what happens if declarer covers the heart jack on the opening lead. East wins and leads a diamond.

If declarer wins and leads a heart. East will win the fourth heart and lead a second diamond. South cannot afford to finesse, so he must win. When East gets in with the space ace, he still has a diamond left to set the contract.

When you are declarer, try to determine who is the safe opponent and who is the dangerous opponent and if you must lose a trick, try to lose it to the safe opponent.
