

Increase interest rate on Eramosa tax arrears

ROCKWOOD — A by-law to increase the interest rate on tax arrears to two-thirds of one per cent per month, commencing the first day of July 1967, was given the necessary readings, passed and numbered H-1967 at the April meeting of Eramosa township council. All members were present and the reeve presided.

Also in attendance were some ratepayers, the road superintendent and the clerk.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and adopted and several items of correspondence were discussed.

Council approved the building inspector issuing building permits on two lots in the Village of Rockwood and these permits were also approved by the sanitary inspector.

Four land severances were agreeable to Council and recommended to the Minister of Municipal Affairs for approval.

Council was also agreeable to Frank Law erecting a building to be used for an alumni fund, subject to the Wellington-Dufferin Health Department approval. The County Assessment Department is willing to furnish the township with building permit forms at no cost.

Mr. Milne and Mr. McPhedran were reappointed as Eramosa representatives on the Mid-Western Tourist Council for 1967 with Mr. Cox and Mr. McPhedran delegated to investigate the possibilities of transferring that portion of the students of Eramosa attending Centre Wellington High School to the Guelph Suburban High School in September 1967.

The Eramosa Council approved the Eramosa Recreation Committee's budget for 1967 to the amount of \$3,500.

The members also moved that Daylight Saving Time shall be observed throughout the township from Sunday, April 30 at 12:01 a.m. to October 29 at 21:01 a.m. Council requested the Wellington-Dufferin Health Unit to furnish the building inspector with a copy of approved septic tank installations.

Resolutions for supplying the township with a three-quarter ton pickup truck were opened and were as follows: (with trade-in) Masson Motors, Acton, G.M.C. — \$2,173.50; Reliable Motors, Fergus, Ford — \$2,227.26; Louis Ehlts, Rockwood, Fargo — \$2,469.60; Carl Small Motors, Guelph, Ford — \$2,509.47. Council decided to allow the Road Superintendent to check into some minor variances in the tenders before a

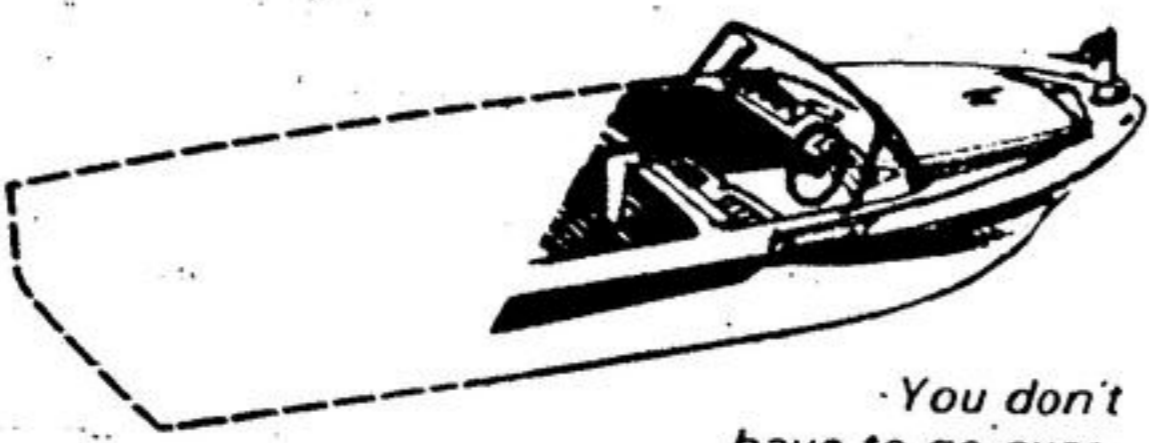
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
