

Milton detachment of Ontario Provincial Police report 38 accidents occured in the North Halton area during the month of March, resulting in 14 injurles and \$65,560 property dam-

The large damage figure is due to one accident on Highway 401 in which a transport truck rolled and burned, with a loss of \$45,000.
