N.D.P. candidate Ted MacDonald speaks on tax help in Acton

Ted MacDonald, N.D.P. candidate in Halton West addressed a social gathering at the home of Bob Drinkwalter, 610 Churchill Rd., Acton, on Sunday dealing with rising taxes and his party's answers to today's pressing problems.

"Recent reports of struggles to keep the mill rate down are symptoms of the most critical time since bankruptcy threatened many of them in depression," Mr. MacDonald said.

"The crisis has been with us so long, and the consequence of crippling property taxes are so serious, that an interim solution can, and should be made for this coming fiscal

"The overall problem is that our municipalities have too many services to meet on the limited resources at their command," he stated. "Residents of Acton, Milton and Georgetown can youch for the truth of this statement as recent press reports will confirm." "It is significant to note that this year the province is provid-

revenues in grants to the municipalities than it did last year, making sharp municipal tax inoreases inevitable," continued the candidate.

The solution, as proposed by Mr. MacDonald: "First, municipalities should be relieved of certain services. The province
