—There are student teachers at the public schools, a couple of them Acton girls.

—The Robert Little school was ringed with cars and school buses for the music festival.

—Dandelions and daffodils have been turning blue around the edges this week. There were several snow flurries.

—"Fast time" starts next weekend. Daylight saving time will be with us until the last Sunday in October.

—The Citizen of the Year dinner is always the best attended Chamber of Commerce meeting of the year. Anyone is welcome.

—New outdoor spotlights at the hydro building are very effective. They give an orange flame effect at the front of the office.

—An anxious fisherman was out in his garden practising casting on his lawn on the weekend. New way to catch worms, maybe?

—Some Robert Little classrooms were temporarily dislocated when competitors in the music festival used their rooms.

—There will be Dominion Day events in Milton and Guelph on July 1. Guelph is having a big parade. Milton expects a brief morning county ceremony.
