

**OPP. report**

During the period April 16 to 22, personnel of the Milton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 933 hours and patrolled a total of 8,607 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol, 63 traffic charges were preferred, 74 traffic violation warnings were issued, 118 vehicles were safety checked, and 60 convictions were registered.

There were three property damage accidents and two personal injury accidents investigated, resulting in five persons being injured and approximately \$3,200 in property damage. Causes of accidents were speed too fast, right of way, impaired driving and careless driving.

There were 44 general occurrences investigated, including the following:

- 1 armed robbery where two persons hired a taxi in Hamilton and drove into Nassagaweya Twp. where the driver was robbed and the taxi stolen; the taxi was recovered the following day in Chinguacousy Twp. area; this investigation is continuing.
  - 1 robbery with violence in Nassagaweya Twp. involving three persons from Guelph, who have been arrested and charged.
  - 1 fraud, involving the passing of a bad cheque at Norval.
  - 1 investigation into the passing of counterfeit money at Mohawk Raceway.
  - 1 malicious damage investigation where an outdoor sign at Cedar Springs Motel on Highway 7 was broken by stones thrown by juveniles.
  - 2 persons arrested for Burlington Police Dept.
  - 1 erratic driver removed from the highway and charged.
  - 2 juveniles missing, and both later located.
  - 5 premises found insecure at night.
  - 2 liquor seizures, resulting in three persons being charged under the Liquor Control Act.
  - Other occurrences were of a minor nature.
- During this period two escorts were supplied for Centennial Caravans travelling in Milton Detachment area.

**Martin House home for aged in use, filling up quickly**

Martin House — the new 155 bed home for Halton's aged — is now in use.

Plagued by delays since work began more than two years ago, the \$1,500,000 building is filling up quickly. The first patients were moved in last Tuesday from the adjacent Halton Centennial Manor and the first "new patients" — patients who hadn't before been in a home — were moved in on Monday.

Superintendent Stanley Allen reports, "things are coming along nicely now, and I would hope that by mid-May we would be able to accommodate all the folks who now have their names on the waiting list."

Some work, including the landscaping, the final grading, the laying of sidewalks and work on the balconies is yet to be completed. Mr. Allen believes, however, that all the work should be done by the 15th of June.

More patients are being moved in every day and so far, no serious problems have developed. Quite a few patients are being moved from the Centennial Manor and their beds are being taken by "new patients."

Despite the many delays, it looks as though the impressive building — named in honor of the Martin family of Milton — will be well worth the wait. The opinions of residents and staff members have had significant influence on the design of the building.

Bright colors which dominate throughout and the audio-visual communications system from rooms to the nurses' station, are unusual in buildings of this type.

A staff of about 75 is required to look after the building. Mr. Allen explained, "there aren't as many residents in the building but more staff will be required because many are bed-care patients."

Mr. Allen expressed appreciation for the patience shown by the people who have had to wait for long periods for the completion of the building. "I found most of the people very co-operative and understanding and I certainly appreciated it," he said.

**Burlington stockbroker Halton West candidate**

Hugh John Lush, a stockbroker, will seek the Liberal nomination for the provincial riding of Halton West, according to a party announcement. His nomination will be made at the Liberal riding meeting scheduled for Friday, April 28, at Nelson High School Auditorium, New Street, Burlington, at 8.00 p.m.

The resident manager of Bache & Company Inc., Jack Lush, as he prefers to be called, is intent on bringing to the Legislature a businessman's approach.

"It is imperative that immediate steps be taken by the Ontario Government to protect Ontario residents and their savings from recurring financial disasters such as Atlantic Acceptance and Prudential Finance", Mr. Lush said. "If we are to realistically meet and conquer the growing problems of taxation, education, housing and agriculture, the present inefficiencies and wastes must be eliminated", he added.

A native of Regina, Saskatchewan, Mr. Lush, 42, is well qualified for election to the Ontario Legislature, having achieved many years of solid finance and investment experience. He is a graduate of Queen's University with a degree in Economics and joined Canadian Johns-Mansville upon graduation as a Financial Analyst, in which capacity he remained for three years.

The next 10 years of Mr. Lush's business career included a number of senior executive appointments with the Montreal Stock Exchange, including the position of Assistant to the President. In 1960 he was appointed Controller of Canadian Liquid Carbonic Corporation. For the last five years Lush has been associated with Bache and Company, having been appointed to his present position as Hamilton Manager in 1964.

Mr. Lush is active in business and community affairs, and currently serves as chairman of the Investment Dealers' Association of Hamilton and Niagara District. He has also served the Heart Fund as well as numerous other community charitable appeals. Married with four children, Jack Lush resides at 332 Walker's Line in Burlington.

**Harley committee drug study seeks to lower cost of drugs**

The report of the Special Committee on Drug Costs and Prices was Tables in the House of Commons on April 3, 1967.

I thought my constituents would be interested to know the conclusions of this committee and in this week's column I will deal with the conclusions of the Drug Committee which are as follows:

- (1) That the price of drugs in Canada is at least higher than it need be;
- (2) That no significant change has taken place in the drug-cost structure since the recommendations of the Hall Commission which were primarily based on the recommendations of the Restrictive Trade Practices Commission;
- (3) That there exists no single method nor simple approach which can be taken to reduce the price of drugs to the consumer, and it is therefore necessary to present a series of recommendations to effect this purpose;
- (4) That since Canadians are paying a significant portion of the cost of international pharmaceutical research, more of this research should be done in Canada by the Pharmaceutical industry;
- (5) That the medical profession is responsible for the prescribing of most drugs, and for these committee recommendations to be fully effective, the medical profession must be fully assured of the safety of all drugs by the Food and Drug Directorate;
- (6) That the implementation of the recommendations could

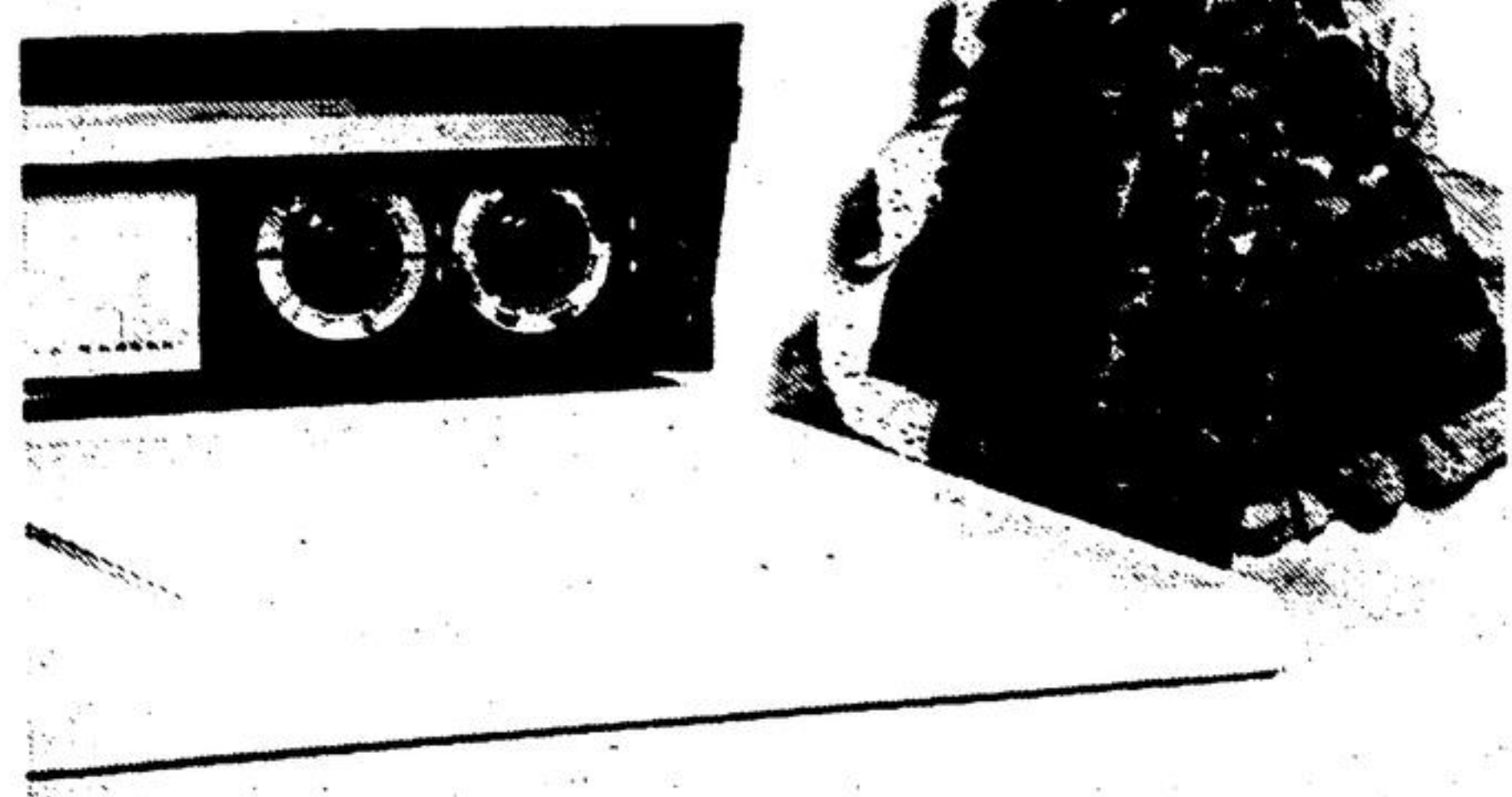
lessen marketing and promotional expenses and reduce excessive profits.

(7) That the implementation of the recommendations could alter in some respects the form of the drug industry as it exists today, removing inefficiencies in the industry and increasing competition;

(8) That in anticipation of national and provincial welfare programmes or the further development of other forms of health services, it is of paramount importance that legislation be introduced at the earliest practical date to implement the recommendations of this committee.

In my next column I will deal with the recommendations to Parliament of this committee.
