Music festival ends with concert final classes in R. Little auditorium

The auditorium of the Robert Little public school in Acton was filled Wednesday evening of last week for the concluding competitions and concert of some of the winners in the music festival.

There were three final competitions that evening.

In the triple duet class for schools six rooms and under, first place was awarded to Norval and the Ruth Evans trophy was presented by G. W. McKenzie, principal of the Robert Little school. The second place Ebenezer church choir shield was given by Mrs. Hayward of Milton to Campbellville competitors.

In triple trio, Brookville placed first to win the Kinsmen club of Milton trophy awarded by J. M. Bell, principal of Martin St. school, Milton. The Halton Music Festival shield

for second place was given to the M. Z. Bennett school, Acton, by Jack Reid of Norval school.

The boys' changed voices choir competition saw the Robert Little entry first, winning the Milton public school board trophy presented by John Johnson of Milton.

The M. Z. Bennett school won the Acton W.I. shield, presented by Mrs. Fred Anderson of the W.I.

In the program of winners, all the gold medal soloists sang for the audience. Brookville junior choir, Robert Little boys' unchanged voices and Norval senior choir and Martin St. school senior choir entertained.

The Martin St. choir won a special centennial trophy donated to the best choir in the festival by adjudicator Mrs.

Russell. The striking red and gold trophy with its centennial crest will remain with the school. The choir was awarded 86 points.

Festival president Mrs. J. Marcoux welcomed the "full house" and other words of appreciation were expressed by principal J. M. Bell, Vic Bristow of Acton public school board, and the adjudicator, Mrs. Vera Russell, who was introduced by public speaking contest winner Carol Patterson of the Robert Little school.

Mr. Bristow especially mentioned his pleasure at the re-introduction of solo classes in the festival. It was an innovation for centennial year.

Medals this year all included a centennial symbol, and special gold certificates were given to every pupil who participated.

Seek conciliator

Nurses, county quit over grey-listing

Bargaining between the Halton County Public Health Nurses and members of Halton County Council's special negotiating committee broke off again last week. County Council asked the nurses to drop their "grey listing" of the local Health Unit before talks could continue, and the nurses refused.

The "grey listing" was begun last fall when the 22 nurses quit their jobs over delays in obtaining a contract with their employer. The Registered Nurses' Association of Ontario "listed" the Unit and urged other nurses not to apply for work there.

After the nurses returned to their jobs, council made them obtain certification as a bargaining unit with the Ontario Labor Relations Board before it would hold further negotiations. The nurses complied, and several meetings were held — with both sides reporting good progress toward a contract — until the meeting last Wednesday evening when council issued the new ultimatum.

Now the nurses are applying to the Labor Relations Board for a conciliator to assist in solving their long-standing dispute with the county.
