

St. Alban's parish travels to Hamilton for ordination

There will be no 10.30 a.m. service next Sunday at St. Alban's church. The parish, including the Church School, is travelling by bus and car to Christ's Church Cathedral in Hamilton, to assist at the ordination of Laurie Doby of this parish.

Mr. Doby will be made a Deacon, the first of the three Holy Orders in the church. Probably within the year Mr. Doby will be ordained to the second order, that of the Priesthood.

At graduation at Seeley Hall in Trinity College, he was commended by the dean of divinity for his pastoral work among the students. He had been named head student.

Laurie will serve the home diocese, Niagara, which covers the area of the peninsula up to Oakville. He will be an assistant at the Archdiocesan Church of the Holy Trinity, Welland, whose rector is the Venerable F. A. Hill.

From now on whenever Mr. Doby functions at the Eucharist he will be vested in a liturgical vestment called the stole, worn across the body from the right shoulder and tied at the waist which is the mark of a Deacon. A Deacon's functions

at Holy Eucharist include proclaiming the Holy Gospel, preparing the chalice at the offertory, bidding the prayers of the congregation, administering the Chalice at Communion and leading other parts of the service. It is customary for a Deacon to baptize, offer to perform marriages, and in case of necessity to anoint the sick.

It is hoped that many will try to be present at Laurie's ordination. The Rev. Ritchie McMurray explains it is an important day in his life. It is an important day in the life of the parish! One of the things that a deacon or priest always remembers in his prayers at the altar are the people of the community that bore and matured him.

"Many will want to offer Laurie's life and vocation in prayer at the Eucharist. For this reason the 9 a.m. service on Sunday, May 14, will be held as usual. Whether or not parishioners intend to be at the Cathedral, they are encouraged to take advantage of the 9 a.m. Eucharist to pray for Laurie."

The service at the Cathedral will be held at 11 a.m. Two buses will load at St. Alban's at 9.30 a.m. sharp and depart immediately for Hamilton.

Boyd Clark, 71, was banker in Acton, the west, Toronto

Funeral service was held at the Rumley-Shoemaker funeral home Saturday afternoon for Clifton Boyd Clark of Acton and Toronto, who passed away in the Private Patients Pavilion, Toronto General Hospital, on Thursday, May 4. Mr. Clark had been in failing health for the past two months. He was 71 years of age.

Rev. A. H. McKenzie conducted the funeral service and interment was in Fairview cemetery, Acton.

He was born at Acton, October 25, 1895, son of G. C. Clark and Mrs. W. J. Gould. He is survived by his sister, Miss Ruby Clark, Acton, a retired school teacher with whom he spent weekends at their home on Bower Ave., and a niece Mrs. J. D. Adams of Buffalo.

He is predeceased by his brother, Campbell Clark.
