es were laid. One male person was charged with care and control of a motor vehicle while his ability was impaired.



WITH ONION 5-8 cut up broiler-fryer chicken

1 envelope Onion Soup Mix 4 cup water

I cup light cream or milk

SAUCE I envelope Cream of Chicken Soup Mix I cup cold water

Place cut up broiler-fryer chicken pieces in single layer in shallow pan. Sprinkle evenly with one envelope Onion Soup Mix. Add ¼ cup water. Cover and bake in 375 deg. F. oven for approximately 50 mins. or until done. Remove chicken to serving platter and keep warm.

Place roasting pan on even heat, stir in one envelope Cream of Chicken Soup Mix and I cup cold water. Stimuntil sauce thickens. Add 1 cup light cream or milk and continue stirring until smooth.
