Best cancer care, research in Canada — Maurice Grimes

The Lakeside Chapter, Imperial Daughters of the Empire, acted as hostesses to a meeting last Tuesday evening where interested people heard Maurice Grimes, executive director of the Ontario Division of the Canadian Cancer Society. Although the attendance was somewhat disappointing, Mr. Grimes' message was most complimentary and stimulating.

He was most impressed with the report from the local campaign convener, and was so pleased with the efforts of local high school students in their fund-raising "walk-in" for the cause that he plans to have their efforts and pictures published in the Cancer Society News Bulletin.

Mr. Grimes spoke briefly on the work of volunteers and explained how even the smallest free helpful act snowballs to help the cause of the total control of the disease. Every year the canvassers, makers of dressings, drivers, baby sitters, innumerable schemes and acts so unselfishly performed, make possible the care of patients and much research in the field.

In his talk on volunteer service he asked each person present to make one little extra effort as their centennial project. All donations of service were precious to the success of the cancer program but none meant so much as the check-up on one's own personal health. This included the persuading of friends to do the same. The order of importance in the cancer campaign is "The Check-up, then the Cheque".

Since Mr. Grimes had recently returned from the International Cancer Congress in Tokyo, he was able to provide some amusing anecdotes, as well as some startling and informative news from around the world. A few of these facts were that although Canada has the second highest standard of living in the world, our province of Ontario has the highest standard of living in the world.
