Halton farmers organize protest march on Ottawa

Halton farmers organized Monday to join 16,000 Ontario and Quebec farmers in a march on Ottawa pressing demands for an improved dairy policy and a "coherent, comprehensive, long range program for all agriculture".

An estimated 100 farmers gathered for a meeting in Stewarttown Hall Monday and heard plans for the May 24 march on the capital that is expected to attract 6,000 Ontario and 10,000 Quebec farmers, organized under the Ontario Federation of Agriculture, the Ontario Farmers Union and the Union Catholique Cultivatures.

At least one busload will be representing Halton and possibly a second, depending on interest. "If we don't go and make a good representation to back up our demands, I can't guarantee how effective an organization you'll have left", Halton Federation Chairman Denzil Lawrence warned the

for each bus. Plans for the trip called for a leaving time to have the bus on Highway 401 by 6 a.m. next Wednesday, May 24. Arrival in Ottawa is scheduled for 10 a.m. with assembly on Major Hill Park back of the capital buildings. Officials are to present a brief to the Prime Minister and Cabinet at 10.30. The Prime Minister is scheduled to address the marchers on Parliament Hill at 1.30. The delegition is expected to be returning about 3.30 p.m. for arrival back about 11 p.m.

The problems of late seeding and the possible loss of a day were warned away as farmers were urged to participate by arranging with a neighbor to do the chores so one could get away. "The one day will perhaps make you more money than you will at home", Chairman Lawrence urged.

"The Minister knew the \$5 per hundredweight was not a negotiable figure. This is what the industrial shipper must have", Mr. Hergott stressed.

A brief reviewed by Mr. Hergott called for the \$5 a hundredweight "after the export subsidy is taken off"; a quota structure change to encourage herd enlargement; industrial subsidies restored for fluid shippers and a skim milk subcould escalate over the pres- sidy for cream shippers.
