Now serving his third year as president of the Canadian National Exhibition, W. H. Evans is recorded as a native of

It's no wonder not even the sharpest old-timers can recall the Evans family, though, and nobody seems to remember being in the same class at

The distinguished president of the C.N.E. was born here all right, but his parents left a few months later, before he even knew his way around. His father was a telegraph operator for the Grand Trunk Railway in Acton and a few months after the birth of son William, the family moved on to Palmerston, a bigger railway centre.

Mr. Evans Sr. subsequently transferred his allegiance to the Canadian Northern Railway, which eventually became part of the Canadian National. The family settled in Beaverton when Mr. Evans was six

Asked about his birthplace, Mr. Evans has to admit he did not have much recollection of either Acton or Palmerston, and is apt to consider Beaverton his hometown.

He has been with Honeywell Controls Co. 36 years this month, having joined it in 1931 as office manager. At that time there was a staff of an even dozen people in all of Canada. Now the organization numbers 2,300 in this country, with
