44% of Halton under 20 years old

Over 44 per cent of the population in Halton is under 20 years of age, County Council learned in an assessment report presented by County Assessor Robert Beech Tuesday.

The report on county population also noted that there were approximately 4,000 children of each age in the 1-12-year-old categories with 3,000 in the 12-19 age groupings.

Of the county's 150,757 population, 11,908 are aged 1 to 3 and 4,863 are 70 and over. In the 20 to 59 group are 73,854.
