Purpose of oil explained to 4-H tractor club

Rockwood — The second meeting of the Erin-Eramosa 4-H Tractor Club was held on Monday, May 15 at Cec's Service Centre on 24 Highway. The president Larry McDougall opened the meeting with the 4-H Pledge and introduced the host Cec Cameron.

Doug Whitfield from Quaker State Oil Refining and Jim Cowan from Cowan Automotive, Guelph, conducted the lesson for the evening titled "Oil for the engine and hydraulic system". It was pointed out that the main purpose of oil is to lubricate, cool, clean and seal. The operator must select the proper type of oil — standard or heavy duty — and the correct grade to suit the climatic conditions. The Operator's Manual will supply this information and reading the Manual is time well spent. The oil should be changed, they state, at recommended intervals, because the detergent additives become depleted as the oil is contaminated, thus the oil does not fulfill its objectives. Mr. Whitfield showed an interesting film on the first oil production in Pennsylvania. In 1857 Colonel Edwin L. Drake joined the Pennsylvania Rock Oil Co. and began oil explorations. The lack of oil drilling equipment created many problems at this time, but new equipment was soon developed. Oil wells sprang up all through the Pennsylvania Mountains and thus began the oil and petroleum industries.

O.P.P. report

Six accidents, 56 occurrences

During the period May 14 to May 20 inclusive, personnel of the Milton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 99 1/2 hours and patrolled a total of 6,990 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol, 19 traffic violation warnings were issued, 38 vehicles were safety checked and 65 convictions registered, Cpl. K. Kingman reports.

There were three personal injury accidents resulting in five persons injured. Three property damage accidents were investigated and approximately \$1,590 in property damage recorded. Causes of accidents were inattentive driving, fail to yield right of way, too fast for road conditions, fire in the engine compartment, fail to share the road, and driver lost control of vehicle. Three traffic violation charges were laid as a result of these accidents.

There were 56 general occurrences recorded during this period, including one break, enter and theft of assorted items in Nassaagaweya Township; three complaints of assault were recorded in which one person was charged; one L.C.A. investigation resulted in one person being charged under the Liquor Control Act; two persons were charged under the Criminal Code, one for possession of stolen property and one for theft.
