"They might if the needs study shows it," said Councillor Hill. "We need a program for the Department to approve over and above the by-law," said the clerk.

"Can this council put a 92 levy on when 6.24 will do?" asked the deputy-reeve. "The Council is obligated to stick to the proposed budget as close as possible." "Who's to say the auditor's figures aren't out?" retorted Mr. Patterson. "Stick to the 6.24 rate," said Mr. Currie.

"Aren't we better off with the \$33,000 left," said Reeve Leslie. "We haven't got a road in shape to get a hard top on. The ninth line (discussed at the last meeting) needs tar and chips, to save it."

Asked by Mr. Hill how much it would cost to do the work the reeve estimated \$2,000 to \$2,500. "If you've got a leaky barn you put a new roof on it," the reeve said making a comparison with road needs.

Further discussion brought a motion by Councillor Hill, seconded by the deputy-reeve to accept the proposed budget as amended. The amendment raised the township 6.24 figure to an even seven mills. It carried unanimously.

Council also discussed:  
● Repairs to the brick on the township building and agreed the suggestion of Jack Gordon would be heeded on repairs.

● Heard the results of a traffic count on No. 5 sideroad.

## Seek arena, parks manager to replace director...

agreed to advertise for a part-time bookkeeper - secretary. They felt perhaps the successful applicant would arrange to work in the arena office a few hours each day, combining secretarial work there with duties as secretary of the board.

The new Glenlea park will be fenced with 290 feet of fencing. Although the estimate exceeded the amount budgeted, chairman Goy said "we want to look after our neighbors."

The ball diamond is made and a backstop is going in. The

fence is necessary to stop balls and children from going into neighboring gardens.

Council is looking after the road and water into the park.

For a trial period of two months, the park will be closed to all "powered vehicles" and all parking will be restricted to the existing parking area around the community centre. Exception to cars allowed in on the track will be emergency vehicles such as fire truck, and cars with boats to be launched.

To improve the parking, an initial paving phase will be started. This involves paving some of the present parking area, with pavement extending over about 300 feet of the present track. Eventually the paving will be extended down to

the wading pool and behind the arena.

Since the paving of part of the track would eliminate races at the fair, two fair board representatives, Walter Linham and Don Matthews, were present at the meeting.

They explained the fair board would not have too much objection to losing the track, as it is only used for pony racing on fair day; the lower end is not suitable for sulky racing and the part alongside the swimming area is dangerous. They felt the fair board would like the section of track where judging takes place widened, and the board was sympathetic to their request.

Although the track is sometimes closed off now, no complaints have been received.
