A trophy shoot will take place at Maple Rock this Sunday, June 4. The event is a 50 bird shoot-off for the Wayne Leadston Trophy. This shoot is for the regular team competitors only and all members are asked to attend and take part. Sunday, June 18 is the date set for the first half of the annual competition with the Halton Sportsmen's Association of Milton. This half takes place at the Milton club and the second half will take place at Maple Rock. This is a team event with five-man teams representing each club.

At last week's County Council meeting councillors were again faced with the question of whether or not Halton should have an open deer season this year.

Two other suggestions were also brought forward — chemical control of deer population ("the pill") or selective killing. From our experiences with deer it would appear the deer are far too smart for any man to select certain deer and kill only those. If the professional hunter is what they mean by selective killing it is certain the killing will not be selective, and indeed it would take a very good hunter to make any appreciable dent in the deer herds if he intends hunting them by himself.

Catching the deer to administer "the pill" should also prove interesting.

Last year the reason given for not having a season was there was too much damage by hunters. A check of the previous deer season indicated no reports were turned in to the Department of Lands and Forests of damage. Any farm animal shot by hunters is paid for by the department if it is reported to them.

Further investigation revealed that the committee of county council that deals with the deer season had indeed had a complaint. It seems a certain farmer who prides himself in his purebred sheep, which are apparently kept for show purposes, was the lone complainer.

Here's a sombre statistical warning. In accidents that occur at highway speeds, the likelihood of death increases about 10 per cent for each one-mile increase over 55 mph. Thus the chances of being killed is twice as great in a 65 mph crash as it is at 55 mph.

Somehow a gate was left open by persons unknown and the wrong sheep got together and followed their natural instincts which produced unwanted cross-bred lambs.

While we sympathize with the farmer in his loss, as far as we can determine no evidence was given to prove that hunters were responsible. However the blame was placed on the hunters by the farmer and the resulting uproar to committee members caused the refusal given to the idea of a deer season.

The government of this county is indeed in sad shape when one unproven case of damage by hunters can cause thousands of hunters to loose the right to an open deer season to appease one farmer. The members of council should base their opinions on the desires of the people whom they are supposed to represent, and not be swayed by one lone complainer.

Other information received indicates the county has no legal right to control any wildlife seasons. This is a custom that has evolved over the years although there is no legal basis for it. We are of the opinion it is time the Department of Lands and Forests took over the control of wildlife, which is rightfully theirs, and give the people of Southern Ontario some sensible wildlife control based on what is needed to keep the wildlife population at a desirable level.

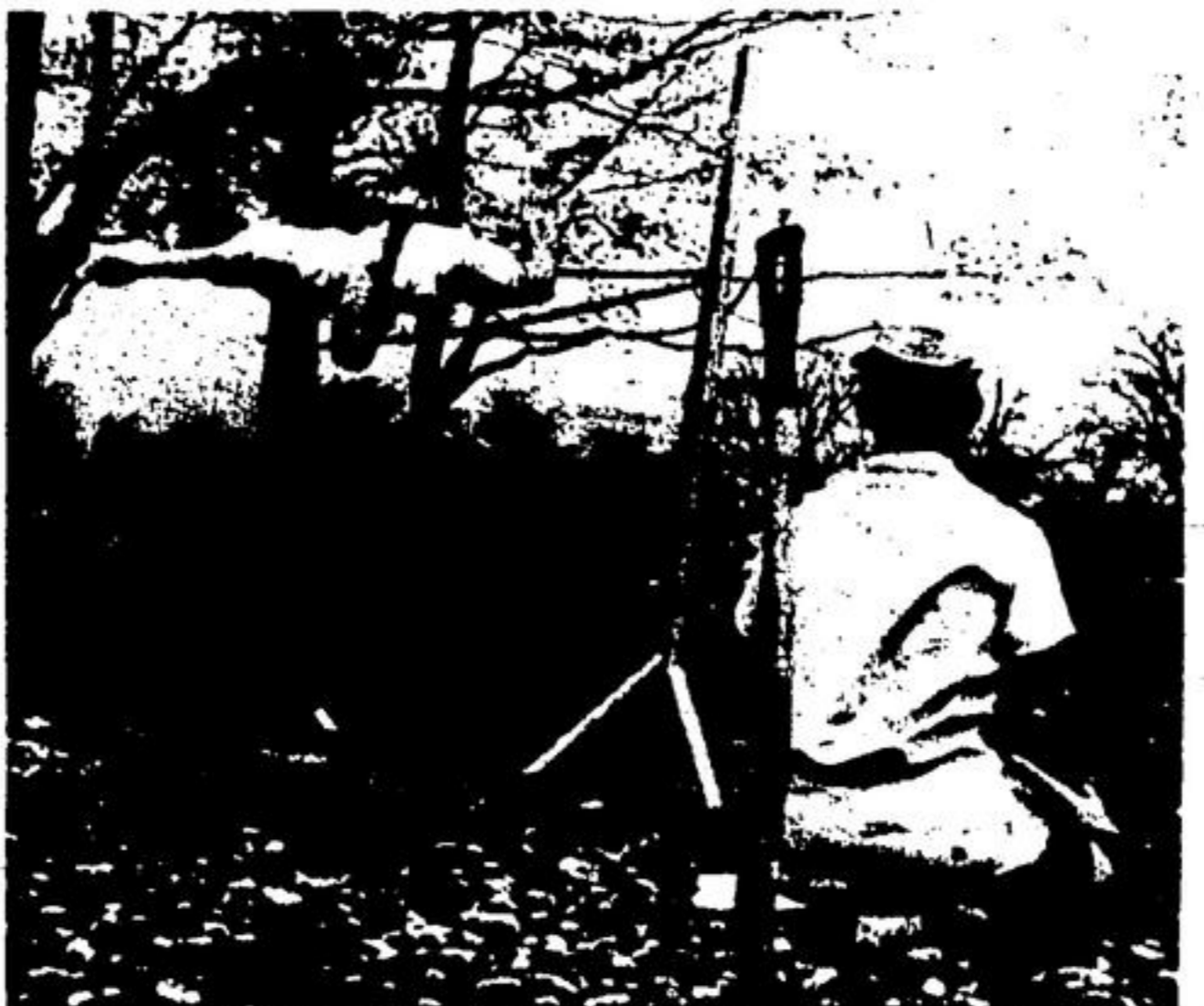
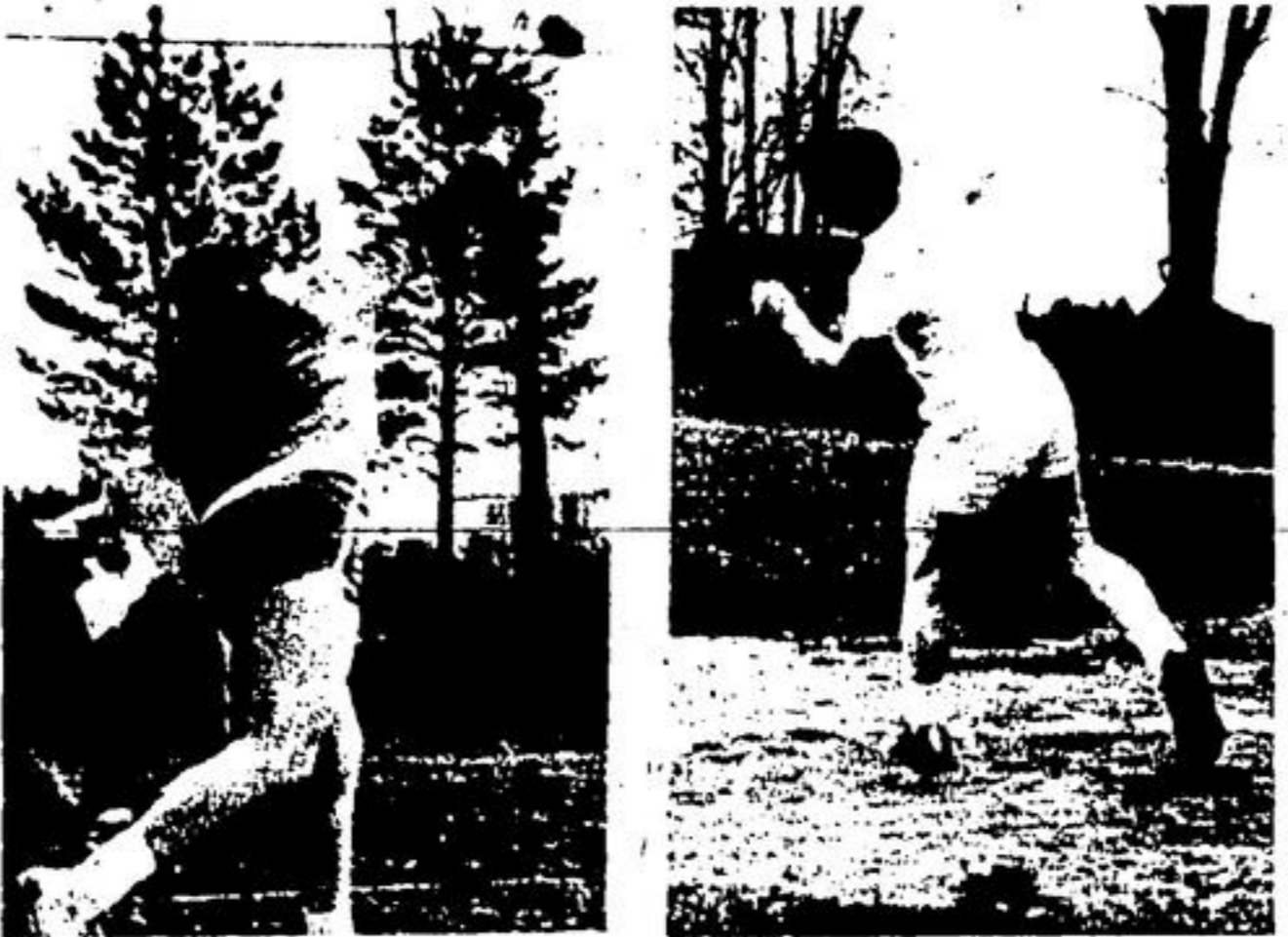

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## Slaven, McKenzie race but fail to place

Jim Slaven, 16, and Alan McKenzie, 17, CWOSSA "A" and "B" distance runners and members of Acton District high school track team bettered their own times in three out of four races in the track and field meet for all Ontario secondary schools at Hamilton Saturday, but failed to place among the top winners. The team mates slashed their way through the rain-swept 440, 880, mile and two mile events.

Jim Slaven, racing his fastest mile, 4:31.5 finished fifth in the junior run, won by Ken Hamilton, Toronto, with a time of 4:20. Again in the two mile he knocked five seconds off his CWOSSA "A" speed attained at Waterloo with a 9:43 time.

Alan McKenzie placed fourth in the 440 match with a time of 52.8 seconds and ran the junior 880 in the pouring rain to finish out of the winner's class.

Both runners rated the Ontario meet as an experience venture and very profitable for future competitors.
