Rev. Laurence Duby, bride married in unique ceremony

In a wedding ceremony unique to St. Alban's, newly-ordained Laurence Gene Duby and Mary-Lou Margaret Creighton were married on Saturday afternoon, May 27.

The celebrant, the Rev. Ritchie McMurray and two concelebrants introduced unusual formalities for the marriage, one of special pleasure and happiness for the Anglican congregation and many friends of both well-known Acton families.

The bride, until her marriage a pharmacist at Guelph General Hospital, is the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Hugh Creighton, 75 Main St. South, Acton.

The groom, who will be curate of Holy Trinity Church, Welland, is the son of Mayor and Mrs. Leslie A. Duby, 194 Churchill Road North, Acton.

After graduation in theology from Trinity College, University of Toronto, he was ordained recently.

Both the bride and the groom went to Acton schools, proceeding to university.

They are both former members of the Acton Junior Pipe Band and played with the Guelph Pipe Band on numerous occasions. Two members of the Guelph Pipe Band, Stewart Rennie and Steven Wolfe, met the bride and groom with the skirl of bagpipes as they came out of the church after the double-ring ceremony.

The retablo behind the altar held four brass vases of white snapdragon, white mums, coral carnations and baby's breath.

The bride wore a formal A-line gown of pure silk organza over silk taffeta with a fitted Empire bodice. Swiss Guipure lace appliques accented the waist, tips of the sleeves and outlined the edge of the detachable chapel train which flowed in a sunburst effect from a soft bow at the back of the neckline. A cluster of organza flowers held a bouffant shoulder-length veil of illusion.

The bride had an heirloom handkerchief from Jerusalem and an 1881 three-penny bit, loaned by her grandmother, in her shoe.
