### Manpower Centre is now responsible for new immigrants

On May 15, the responsibility for service to newly arrived immigrants in this area was transferred from the Immigration Division to the Manpower Division of the Department of Manpower and Immigration. The Canada Manpower Centre at 70 Fountain Street Bast in Guelph, is now responsible for reception, emergency essistance when necessary, family and occupational counselling and placement in suitable jobs of all newly arrived immigrants. Those immigrants who are required to repay the cost; of transportation to Canada should continue to make payments to the Immigration Division of the Department of Manpower and Immigration at 75 Farguhar Street, in Guelph.

Close liaison is being maintained between the Manpower and Immigration Divisions of the department to ensure a high degree of service to immigrants.

Employers who previously

were in contact with the Immigration Division regarding job opportunities for immigrants now contact the Canada Manpower Centre, Guelph. Room and board, rental accommodation, especially furnished accommodation, is urgently required for newly arrived immigrants on a con-

tinuing basis. Persons with available accommodation are urged to contact the Canada Manpower Centre in Guelph. The majority of immigrants locating in this area are carefully selected and highly qualified skilled workers and professional men and women. The Canada Manpower Cen-

tre in Guelph has fully qualified counsellors to assist immigrants to settle rapidly in the area. These men and women can contribute to the economic and cultural life of the area if they are afforded the hospitality and friendship for which their fellow Canadians in the area have become noted. The Canada Manpower Centre welcomes any assistance offered by ethnic groups and others in making the transition of immigrants into the Canadian way of life as easy and pleasant as possible.



The past week in the House of Commons has been a quiet one, generally devoted to the consideration of estimates, which is the detailed examination of proposed government spending for the year ending

March 31, 1968. Several government departments are under consideration at the present time. It is generally expected that most of the month of June will be given over to such study by the House of Commons.

There will be a few Bills to be considered, but these will be non-controversial with the possible exception of the resolution to remove Mr. Justice Landreville from the Supreme Court. The matter will be introduced in the Senate next week and will then be debated in the House of Commons. It is expected that this resolution will carry and then the Governor-General will order his removal from the

It may well be that during the debate, the Justice may granted permission to speak at the bar of the chamber of the House of Commons as he has requested.
