

A sport that is fast becoming popular in Ontario is bow fishing for carp. In the past few years more and more waters have been opened for this sport and the carp which has been ignored by anglers for years are now being harvested.

The usual equipment is a bow of 40 or 50 pounds pull. The arrows are of sturdy fiberglass with rubber feathers. A reel is attached to the bow and it contains about 25 yards of 90 pound test braided line which is attached to the arrow head. Since carp are frequently seen in shallow areas of lakes and es on the squads shooting for often their back is above wathe trophies. John came up ter, they make ideal targets for the bow fisherman.

Shortly after the limited season was tried on a section of the St. Lawrence River a bow fishing derby was organized by the Seaway Valley Archers.

The derby was first organized in 1964 and has become an annual event. The three year total is 2,505 carp with a total weight of 17,095. The carp range as high as 50 lbs. but 3 to seven pounds is average.

Over the years since the derby was organized the women take almost as many as the men and win as many prizes

Since the introduction of bow fishing for carp in 1962 the Department of Lands and Forests has opened more waters each year due to the popularity of the sport. The Department is co-operating with the bow fishermen because a formerly waste fish is now being harvested and providing recreation at the same time.


