



Irishman loses on "17th"

Rev. Andy McKenzie strokes to fourth Acton Open cup

At least one red-headed Irishman will look with suspicion on the presence of a red-headed Presbyterian padre on the 17th hole in a golf tournament like Saturday's Acton Open.

Andrew O'Nolan had a two stroke lead on the Rev. Andrew McKenzie as their four-

some teed off for the seventeenth in the biggest ever Acton Open on the tricky Georgetown Golf and Country Club course.

"He should have played it cosy," chuckled the Rev. Andy, "but his wood shot for the green didn't land square on the ball and it took off on an angle for the rough where it nested behind some trees. That's when he blew it."

It isn't often an Irishman loses on the 17th. Needless to say the Rev. Andy took the low gross in the tournament with a score of 83 to win the top individual award for the fourth time.

Previous wins for Andy were in 1958 when he tied with Mick Holmes at Orangeville, in 1961 at Georgetown and 1963 at Hilltop in Erin. Runners-up were Julian Zajac, who turned in a neat 85 and tied for third were frustrated Andy Nolan and Constable Bruce McArthur with 86's.

John Krapek came next with an 87 and Murray Scoyne had an 88. Stu McDonald carded a 90, Mick Holmes drove a 92, Brian Moore, Bill Pendleton and Gary Meecham tied at 94 and John Goy Jr. shot a 95. Eighty-four golfers played in the annual open and of that number 21 or exactly 25 per cent. broke 100.

Top score of the afternoon went to visitor Tony Dockus of Toronto. He shot a sizzling 79; 40 in the first nine and 39 in the second. However, he wasn't eligible for any of the trophies and his biggest satisfaction must come from trimming Acton's best.

Rain which threatened early in the afternoon came down in a real deluge when Jupiter Pluvius finally decided to try

the watering can. Few of the golfers were finished and many were soaked from their eyeballs down before they finished the 18.

"We just finished the seventeenth and down she came," said low gross trophy winner McKenzie. Others were not so fortunate.

After the tourney and everyone had gone home to dry out, golfers went to the Legion hall where trophies were presented by Rev. Andy McKenzie. This year's committee in charge of the Open was headed by Dr. Brian Moore assisted by Jack Pink, Andy Nolan and Rev. McKenzie.

A bounteous and delicious supper served by the Legion Ladies topped it all off except for a draw on golf clubs which was won by Bob Emmerson.

Low net trophy which is figured out on the Atlantic system went to Roy Weaver and Bruce Cunningham who both had 66's. Runners-up were Mel Jordan 66, Brendan Aherne 68, Jack Pink 69, John Weldon and Bob Emmerson each with a 70. Andy Nolan, Don Ryder and Frank Spielvogel with 71's.

Golfer with the highest score who is dubbed the "most honest" was Brendan Aherne out for the second time in his life. This amiable, quiet spoken Irishman had 153.

Low gross for the junior golfers was won by Roy Shultis who carded a 99 and had nothing higher than a six on any hole.

O.G.A. handicap champion was Murray Scoyne whose 88 and 16 stroke handicap gave him a 72.

Longest drives of the day were credited to John Krapek, Mick Holmes and Andy McKenzie.

Birdies, a real feat on this

course, were sunk by Andy McKenzie on the fifth and seventeenth, Jack Drysdale on the eighth, John Goy on the eighth and Bruce McArthur on the ninth and Ron Heller on the eleventh hole.

Andy Nolan chipped the ball into the cup from off the green on the seventh hole. Highest scores on a single hole were recorded by Brendan Aherne with a 14 on the par five first and Dave Neely with a 14 on the par four second.

With another success under their belts golfers elected Harold Townsley to head the committee for the 1968 tournament. He'll be assisted by Ted Pratt, Murray Scoyne, Bruce McArthur and John Krapek.

A. J. Foyt of Houston, Texas and 29 other drivers from the United States will take their first practice spins around the Mosport track today in preparation for Saturday's running of the "Indy 200" trophy race sponsored by the Toronto Telegram.

For the first time, the drivers will be leaving the oval shaped U.S. tracks to compete in a road race on the twisting 2.5 mile circuit of Mosport.

The winner in the two-heat, 200 mile race will receive \$20,000 of the \$85,000 purse. Foyt, winner of the Indianapolis 500 and the grueling Le Mans, will be joined at Mosport by his racing partner Dan Gurney of California, who holds the lap record at Mosport of 1:23.1.

Mario Andretti, the U.S. club champion, will also be on hand with his Brawner-Brabham Ford, as well as Joe Leonard of San Jose, Calif., who finished third at Indianapolis.

New York Yankees lost "one of the best" in modern day baseball when Whitey Ford retired May 30 at the age of 38 because of a loose bone spur in his left elbow.

The witty left-hander, born and raised in New York, finished with a 236-106 won-lost record and a .690 percentage. One of the last symbols of the old Yankee dynasty, Ford had been with the club since July, 1950, pitched on 11 pennant winners and held a flock of World Series records.

In addition to most victories, 10, and strikeouts, 94, Ford broke Babe Ruth's World Series record for consecutive scoreless innings with a 3 1/2 inning streak from 1960-1962.

Ford was 25-4 in 1961 and 24-7 in 1963 and won the Cy Young award as the outstanding pitcher in the majors in 1961. Mike Burke, president of the Yankees, said Ford would remain with the organization as a scout.

The National Hockey League Players Association came into being Wednesday of last week at the N.H.L. annual meeting and was formally welcomed and endorsed by the league owners.

Alan Eagleson, 33-year-old Toronto lawyer who is president of Toronto Rifles of the Continental Football League, represented the players.

Membership in the players' association is on a voluntary basis and for the present it is confined to the N.H.L.

Bob Pulford of Toronto Maple Leafs was elected president. Associated with him are Pierre Pilote of Chicago, Bob Nevin and Harry Howell of New York, Norm Ullman of Detroit, Ed Johnston of Boston and J. C. Tremblay of Montreal.

The association was formed to act as a bargaining group for the players.

The six team owners will have a committee of six, three from each of the east and west divisions of the league.

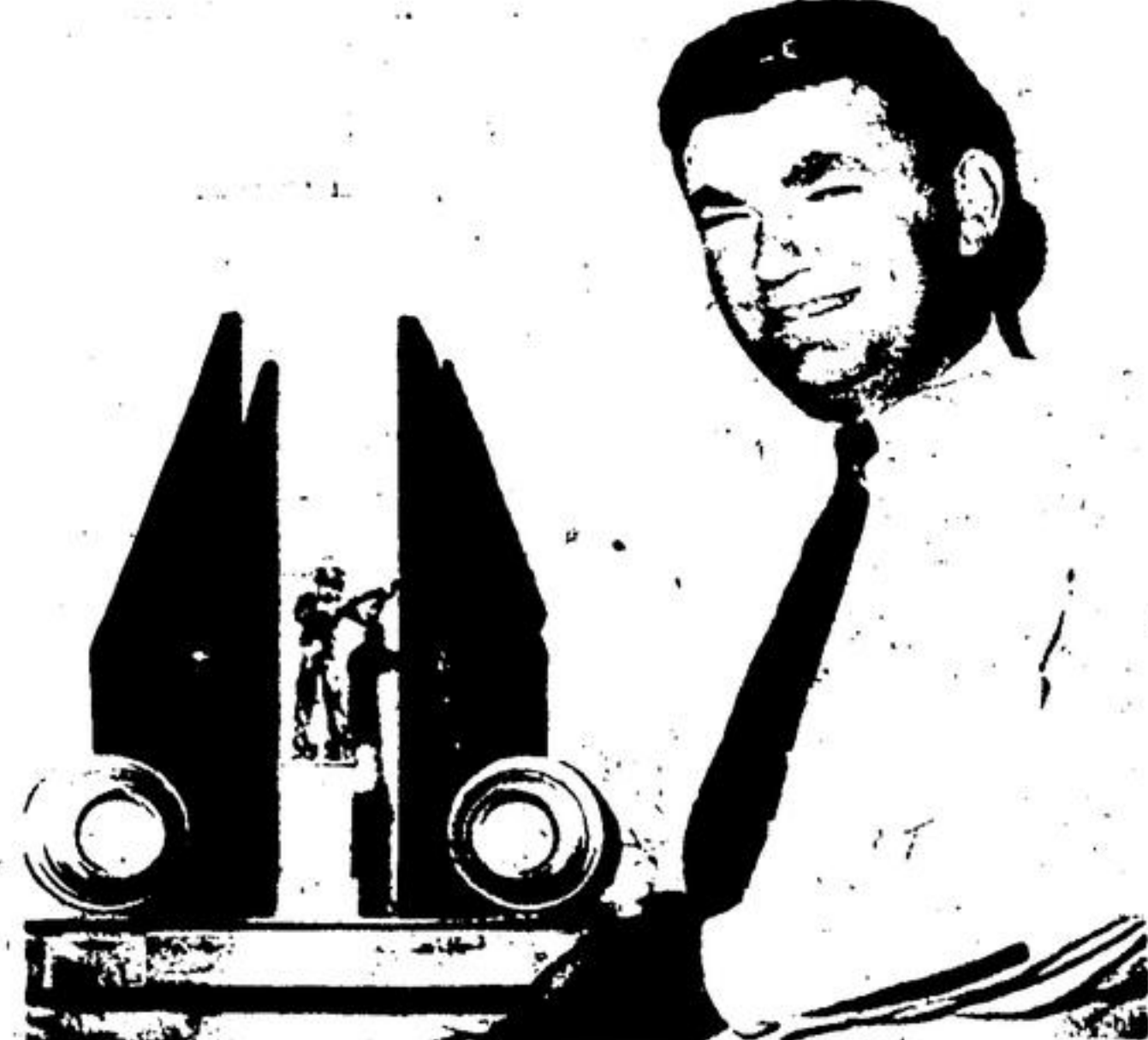
