

Investigate incinerator

Councillor Ted Tyler Jr. told councillors he, the clerk and the town superintendent went to Ajax recently to view an incinerator which the sanitation committee is considering for the town dump.

He reported the incinerator worked efficiently, but his committee was still investigating all possibilities.

The clerk-administrator said the company contacted was pleased with Acton's proposed site for an incinerator and they know the town's requirements. "They're going to come up with something to suit Acton," said Mr. McGeechie.

Councillor Tyler reported all garbage being forwarded into the dump was being weighed, courtesy Acton. Limestone Quarry coles, and the company was drawing up specifications on this information.

Best catch made good big breakfast

Fishermen's luck has been good in the fishing areas maintained by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, reports superintendent Norm McMahon.

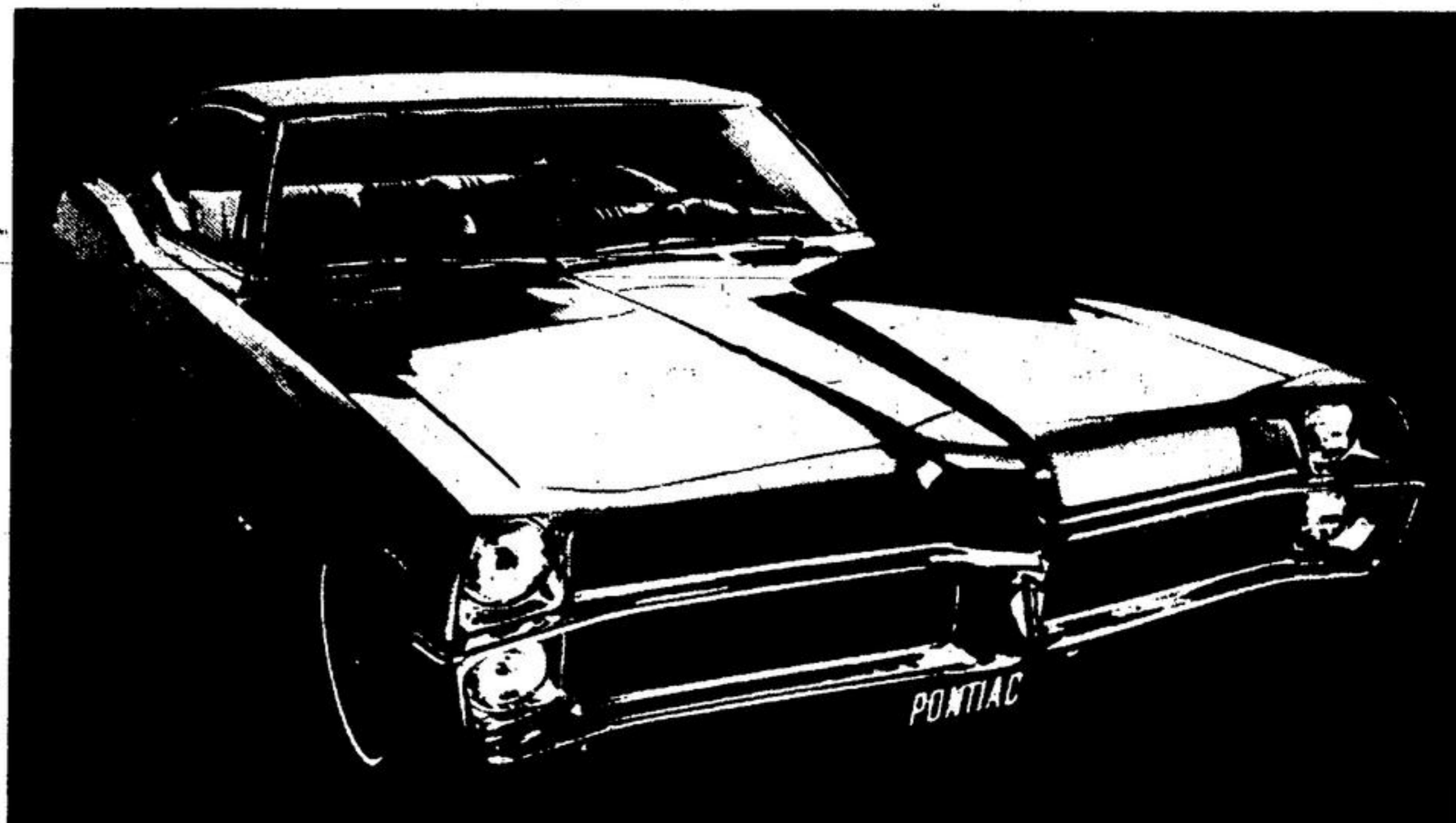
Best catch yet this spring was that of Steven Petruck, 62 Queen St. S., Streetsville. He pulled in a five pound, 18 1/2 inch speckled trout while camping recently at Terra Cotta Conservation Area. No picture of the prize catch is available because Mr. Petruck was fishing for his breakfast and he was hungry!

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority, with the cooperation of the Department of Lands and Forests, stocked the lakes at Terra Cotta and the Credit River at Belfountain this spring. This is a yearly project of the Authority and makes for excellent fishing. Just before fishing season opened, 5,000 trout were laded into the area lakes and the river.

Mr. McMahon reported that many two and three pound trout are being caught in the conservation areas.
