Halton's development potentials basis for County industrial film

Halton County Council, through its industrial committee, has commissioned Robert J. Meyer Productions of Dundas to write and produce a motion picture to promote area development of the County of Halton.

Area development, the committee points out, should be taken to imply the development of residential, commercial, agricultural and recreational and cultural as well as manufacturing potentials of the county.

The theme of the motion picture centers around a graduate secondary school student at a point of decision concerning

his future, choosing his career of furthering education and a place for settling down, illustrating the range of choice that is open to him in the area. The student is a native of Halton, taking a second look about him through his memories, his thoughts, and his ambitions and assessing all that he sees of the assets in both towns and country.

All parts of the county are being covered by the color camera this spring and summer, capturing the changing landscape and the events of the season and representing the activities of the student as he decides to continue in the fall at one of the more than five places of higher learning that are easily available to Halton County residents.

The 20-minute sound-color motion picture will be available for showings locally and across Canada early in 1968.

TB association expands concern, delegate learns

Increasing scope of responsibility, being undertaken now by the Tuberculosis Association, impressed Acton reeve Bert Hinton, when he attended the 67th annual meeting of the Canadian Tuberculosis Association, combined with the ninth annual meeting of the Canadian Thoracic Society, at the Chateau Frontenac, Quebec City.

He represented Halton County Tuberculosis and Health Association, taking in the convention for his own information and at his own expense.

The Canadian Association is also considering adding "and Health" to its title, as Halton has done.

Few board members attended the meeting — those registered were mostly staff and the talks were technical. There were sessions on nursing and rehabilitation as well.

Among the speakers were Dr. Halfdan Mahler, Geneva, who expressed deep concern over the continuing incidence of TB in underdeveloped countries of the world; and the doctor from Theford Mines who specializes in improving conditions there to prevent lung disease.

O.P.P. register 44 convictions

During the period June 4 to 10 inclusive, personnel of the Milton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 843 1/2 hours and patrolled a total of 7,105 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol, 14 traffic charges were preferred, 44 traffic violation warnings were issued, and 25 vehicles were safety checked. There were 44 convictions registered.

There were 6 personal injury accidents resulting in 9 persons being injured; 8 property damage accidents investigated; and approximately \$7,045 in property damage was recorded. Causes of accidents were: inattentive driving, improper turn, fail to yield right of way, follow too close, and speed too fast for road or traffic conditions. Five charges under the Highway Traffic Act were laid as a result of these accidents.

There were 51 general occurrences during this period, including two break and enters; one fraud investigated resulting in one person being charged; a double drowning in the Credit River investigated; one juvenile missing from Esqueving Township; one premise found insecure at night; three complaints of persons trespassing on private property. All other occurrences were of a minor nature.

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LOCAL TRUST COMPANY INCREASES DIVIDEND TO SHAREHOLDERS

Halton & Peel Trust increases quarterly dividend to 15c a share, up from 12 1/2c

In an interview with O. E. Manning, President of Halton & Peel Trust, he stated that Savings and Term Deposits total \$63,100,000, an increase since January 1st, 1967, of \$2,600,000. Total Assets Under Administration \$73,000,000, an increase since January 1st, 1967, of \$3,400,000.

Mr. Manning said that total dividends paid to shareholders over the past nine years amounted to \$720,150. At the same time Reserves have been built up to \$2,000,000.

The new quarterly dividend of 15c a share, payable July 14th next, is at the rate of 12% on the \$5. per value shares, giving a return of 4% at a price of \$15. per share.

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
