

There is one exception, however, and that is the lead of king from ace-king. This can be a little confusing for the defenders, therefore it is up to declarer to take any advantage that he can of the situa-

The Bath Coup exploits this ambiguity of the king lead from both ace-king and kingqueen. Here is an example of this which occurred last week at the Acton Bridge Club. Board No. 13; dealer North:
