## Let's Play Bridge

It is customary in North America to lead the highest card from a sequence. That is, you lead king from king-queen, queen from queen-jack etc.

There is one exception, however, and that is the lead of king from ace-king. This can be a little confusing for the defenders, therefore it is up to declarer to take any advantage that he can of the situation.

The Bath Coup exploits this ambiguity of the king lead from both ace-king and king-queen. Here is an example of this which occurred last week at the Acton Bridge Club.

Board No. 13; dealer North; both sides vulnerable.

tion, asking South if he held a four card major. When South showed a four card spade suit, North jumped straight to game.

West decided to use an active defense. He led the king of diamonds. When East played the ten, South decided to try the Bath Coup. South followed with the four of diamonds. West thought that East wanted the suit continued. This would be the best defense if West had the ace and king of diamonds. But, alas, West had king-queen and the continuation gave declarer an extra diamond trick.

Declarer won the second diamond with the jack after West had led a low diamond. Trumps were drawn and one heart trick conceded. Making five on the hand was good for a top board. Two other declarers made four spades on the nose, while another tried three no trump, making four. Next time you hold a suit headed by the ace-king and your opponent on the left leads the king, try the Bath Coup. Play low to the trick and hope the defender will continue the suit.
