### Salary hassle

## Engage Medical Officer for County

Despite a verbal battle over his \$17,000 salary, Halton County Council has approved the engagement of a new Medical Officer of Health for Halton.

Dr. H. B. Hay, 51, a former military doctor presently serving as hospitals administration consultant for the New Brunswick Department of Health, was named as the replacement for Dr. A. F. Bull who resigned his post here earlier this year to accept a position with the Federal Department of Health.

Dr. Hay presently living in Moncton, N.B., consults a staff

of 39 provincial hospitals serving a population of 190,000. His staff includes 18 nurses and five inspectors. A doctor since 1935, he had an extensive military career prior to joining the N.B. Department of Health in 1960.

"Why the extensive raise in salary above our last M.O.H.?" Milton Deputy-Reeve Charles Menefy wanted to know, when County Council was about to approve a motion engaging Dr. Hay at Thursday's special meeting.

Applicants the committee interviewed were former military doctors and one was now receiving \$19,700 a year.

A vote was called and Deputy-Reeve Menefy requested a recorded vote. The motion engaging Dr. Hay was approved by a 25-6 count.

St. Peter's Church, Oustic, was nearly completely filled for a centennial church service there Sunday morning, June 25. The service is one in a series being held throughout the town during centennial year.
