Some time ago we reported a duck shot down in Venezuela that had been tagged in the Lakehead harbour. On January 15, 1967 a blue-wing teal was downed southwest of Coronie Surinam. The tag was put on at the Lakehead on August 26,

Assuming the duck flew a straight course we estimate it was slightly over 3,000 miles from the banding location. Surinam is situated on the north east bulge of South America, on the Atlantic Ocean side. It lies between British and French Guiana and was formerly

known as Dutch Guiana. From 1964 to date 240 bands have been received. They came from 23 states ranging from Florida, Louisiana and Texas on the south to Wisconsin and Minnesota on the north, and from Alabama and Virginia on the east to Dakota on the west. During 1964-66 the total number of ducks banded was 2383."

The total recovered represents 10 per cent and is considéred a good recovery. The various species recovered were 146 Blacks, 59 Mallards, 24 Blue-Wing Teal, 14 Green-Wing Teal and 2 Pintail.

A problem that has been plaguing Hydro Commissions throughout Ontario is damage to insulators by hunters. Some marksmen consider the

shiny insulators at the top of hydro poles as ideal targets for practice. The annual damage toll in Ontario to hydro lines by hunters is \$30,000. The practice is very danger-

ous as it is not uncommon for the line to break when the insulator is shattered. This presents a danger of electrocution to people nearby and to the hunter himself. This also can be the cause of forest fires.

Last year in the Geraldton area 1600 customers were plunged into darkness and the radio station at Lindsay was out of commission due to a power failure resulting from this type of damage.

While the fine or imprisonnent that may result upon conviction of malicious damage of this nature is not likely enough to deter these so-called sportsmen, it should be remembered by anyone tempted to use insulators as targets that this is a criminal offense and if caught they will have a criminal record for the rest of their
