Nine charges laid report two accidents

The period July 9 to July 15, produced a week of hectic activity for the officers of the Acton O.P.P. Two hundred and four work hours were consumed, while 520 miles of cruiser patrol were logged.

A total of 15 occurrences recorded included the investigation of a Break, Enter and Theft at the Acton Jersey Dairy, the quelling of two disturbances and the handling of 12 other complaints.

In all, the occurrences resulted in nine charges being laid, of which four were "Assaulting a Police Officer", four men from Brampton and Guelph being arrested and lodged at the Halton County Jail at Milton.

Two accidents, one a Hit and Run, and the other causing personal injury occurred. Investigation into the identity of the culprit vehicle involved in the Hit and Run are being pursued, while charges have been laid in the injury accident.

Other traffic activities caused a marked increase in our enforcement index, as 12 charges and 29 warnings for Traffic Act violations were recorded against the motoring public from and passing through the Acton area.

Information sworn to this week indicates larger Court Dockets to come than the one experienced in Milton Magistrate's Court on July 10. One charge was dealt with, resulting in a local man being convicted for Drinking while on the interdicted list, and receiving a six month suspended sentence as punishment.

Vagrancy, rape, liquor charges laid by O.P.P.

During the week of July 9 to 15 inclusive, personnel of the Milton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 799 hours and patrolled a total of 6,765 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol, 38 traffic charges were preferred, 41 traffic violation warnings were issued, and 23 vehicles were safety checked. There were 77 convictions registered.

There were four personal injury accidents resulting in seven persons being injured; five property damage accidents investigated and approximately \$7,200 in property damage recorded. Causes of accidents were, inattentive driving; fail to yield right of way; fail to share the road; and drove off roadway. There were four charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act as a result of these accidents.

There were 33 general occurrences during this period, including: one sexual offence investigated, resulting in one person being charged with rape; one person charged with vagrancy; one stolen car from Esquesing Township later recovered in Guelph; one motorcycle and one stolen auto recovered for other police departments; three liquor in-
