Vagrancy, rape, liquor charges laid by O.P.P.

During the week of July 9 15 inclusive, personnel of Milton Detachment, Ontario Provincial Police, worked a total of 799 hours and patrolled a total of 6,765 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol, 38 traffic charges were. preferred, 41 traffic violation warnings were issued, and 23 vehicles were safety checked. There were 77 convictions reg-

istered. There were four personal injury accidents resulting in seven persons being injured; five property damage accidents investigated and approximately \$7,200 in property damage recorded. Causes of accidents were, inattentive driving; fail to yield right of way; fail to share the road; and drove off roadway. There were four charges laid under the Highway Traffic Act as a result of these accidents.

There were 33 general occurrences during this period, including; one sexual offence investigated, resulting in one person being charged with rape; one person charged with vagrancy; one stolen car from Esquesing Township later recovered in Guelph; one motorcycle and one stolen auto recovered for other police departments: three liquor innight. All other occurrences were of a minor nature.
