(Continued from Page 1) a \$5,000 annual salary the discussion resolved around about \$1 a day. "We have to keep our employees in a frame of mind where they will be encouraged to give good service", he maintained.

Reeve Hinton pointed out the \$1 a day represented about \$40,000 a year which was as much as Acton's contribution to county government. "This ts not an inconsiderable emount", he argued.

Deputy Roeve C. Menely of Milton opposed the increase. suggesting there are many inequities in the present schedule. He suggested it would be much more beneficial to wait until a proper job evaluation is completed. "Five per cent across the board won't satisfy anyone", he maintained.

Deputy Reeve Rogers of Burlington suggested employees get "sick and tired of waiting. They have no faith in promises. Let them have something now more than a promise", he

argued. A recorded vote for the raise won the support of Reeve Gallagher and Deputy Reeve Rogers of Burlington, Reeve Merry and Deputy Reeve Day of Oakville and Reeve Coulter and Deputy Roeve Hoey of Nassag-
