

Andy Frank namesakes Sheriff, Indian Chief get together at last

Halton Sheriff Andy Frank of Milton, holidaying with his wife and son Reid in Western Canada, finally got together with his Indian Chief namesake two weeks ago.

Andy Frank the Sheriff and Andy Frank the Chief of the Comox Band at Courtenay, B.C., finally met each other on Thursday, July 13, at Courtenay. A story in the Comox District Free Press says:

"Thursday the namesakes met at last. Chief Andy Frank, resplendent in his full regalia, solemnly met Sheriff Andy Frank of Milton, Ont., for the first time since they had discovered they were namesakes last autumn.

"It was a high moment for both, for Sheriff Frank because he had travelled the long trail from Milton—about midway between Hamilton and Toronto—to meet Chief Frank and for Chief Frank because he had been able to take the sheriff in tow and show him the wonders of the land of his people.

"Both obviously were impressed with one another.

"To mark the meeting, the Sheriff of Milton had given Chief Frank a secret talisman which the chief wears close to his vest. For his part, Chief Frank gave his new-found friend from Ontario what the Comox call a I. Hose, a talisman which gives the receiver supernatural powers, powers which will make him a great man among his own.

"As he walked about Chief Frank's home on the Duke Rd.,

Sheriff Frank fairly bubbled with enthusiasm for the treatment accorded him by Chief Frank and for the Comox Valley as a whole. He pointed at the calm, blue sea. He pointed at the snow-sprinkled mountain peaks, at the vastness of the green about him. "Surely," he said, "you live in a paradise. I only hope you people here know what you've got."

"At the same time, Sheriff Frank remained a loyal Ontario and especially a loyal son of Milton. "Do you know," he said, "that our county is the fastest growing county in Canada?" To back up his statement, he mentioned that the county's population in 1958 was 71,000, while today it stood at 165,000. However, after this forgivable bit of home-towing, he was enthusiastically speaking about the privilege of salmon fishing with his host.

"Sheriff Frank left Milton on July 5 for a three week vacation. By the time he has returned home, he will have, he said, travelled by all major conveyances — by aircraft, by train, by auto and by bus.

"Any regrets? Sheriff Frank had only one — he wished that his wife had accompanied him into the Comox Valley instead of remaining in their hotel in Victoria. Sheriff Frank's enthusiasm for the district and Chief Frank's hospitality was matched by his 18-year-old son Reid, who had accompanied his father to the home of the Comox Valley chieftain."

Good results at high school

Students at Milton District High School had good results in their examinations this year, members of the school board learned at their July meeting.

Promotion results presented to the board indicated the percentages obtaining standing were: in grade nine, arts and sciences 88%, business and commerce 86%, science, technology and trades 84%; in grade 10, arts and science 86%, business and commerce 91%, science, trade and technology 85%; in grade 11, five year arts and sciences 95%, business and commerce 86%, four year arts and science 92%; in grade 12, five year arts and science 75% and four year arts and science 80%.

MILTON COUNCIL BRIEFS

During a regular meeting on Monday, members of Milton Council:

• Approved holding a Garden Party on August 25 as one of the town's centennial projects under the guidance of the centennial manager.

• Were advised the Ontario Municipal Board approval for the Milton District High School addition had still not been received.

• Decided to abandon a suggestion death notices be aired on a radio station for the benefit of older citizens, because the cost was considered excessive and the necessary permission difficult to obtain.

• Agreed the possibility of picnic tables and benches donated by the School for the Deaf for Centennial Park, would be quite a welcome gesture.

• Were advised by Mayor Childs that new regulations and legislation governing welfare would take more office time. He noted it would be a distinct advantage to have a county welfare system. Deputy Reeve Menefy noted such a system had been rejected by county council.

• Authorized the holding of the annual Steam-Era parade in town on September 2, starting from Milton Plaza at 12:30 noon and proceeding to Milton Fair Grounds.

• Agreed to hear the County Assessor and a Department representative speak on the county assessment commissioner system on September 11, if that date was mutually agreeable. It was noted Milton had endorsed such a system two years ago.

Sandra Helen Wilson, 16, of R.R. 3, Milton, was injured and her car received \$900 damage in an accident near Milton Wednesday afternoon of last week.

Council won't cut your elm tree down

Milton Council will not be cutting down your elm tree. A by-law proposed to Milton Council recently called for town removal of elms on private or public property to try to minimize the effect of the destructive Dutch Elm disease that is denuding the countryside.

Reeve A. Ledwith reported a conversation with a Department of Agriculture representative who suggested the disease had now spread beyond control. "It's too late to control the disease now by cutting them down," he suggested. The reeve also reported the works superintendent's estimate of \$20,000 to remove all

the diseased trees in town on public and private property. Councillor C. Johnson observed the province apparently had no solution to the problem if the array of dead elms along the highways was any indication.

"There would be little use of Milton having such a by-law if surrounding municipalities did not, and I can imagine what a staggering sum it would require in a rural municipality," he concluded.
