

Campbellville still leaders win over Preston, Oakville

Campbellville Merchants defeated attempts by Preston on Saturday and Oakville on Wednesday to put a halt to their hot winning streak. The Villagers also held a 10 lead over Hamilton on Sunday when the game was called after one complete inning because of rain.

Campbellville maintained their hot streak Saturday as they went into Preston and whipped the Pirates by an 11-3 score.

Ralph Rintoul went seven and one-third innings to chalk up his second win of the season. He gave up three runs off six hits while striking out eight and walking nine.

Harry Hamilton in relief walked two, struck out one and held the home team hitless in one and two-thirds innings.

Henderson and Ostwin hurried for Preston and they allowed eleven runs off thirteen hits. They walked five, struck out eight and hit one batter.

Campbellville jumped into a 1-0 lead in the first as Repta walked, stole second, went to third on a passed ball and scored on an infield out.

Campbellville built the score up to 3-0 in the top of the second. King doubled, was sacrificed to third and scored on Andrews' single. Andrews went to third on Rintoul's double and scored on an error. Preston got one in the bottom of the second to make it 3-1. Renner singled and was forced home by three walks. Preston closed the gap to 3-2 by scoring in the fourth. Stark walked, went to third on Darcy's double and scored when Rintoul failed to hold on to Chandler's rap back through the box.

Campbellville came right back with two in the fifth to make it 5-2. Moore walked, stole second, went to third as Elliot forced McPhail at second after the latter had walked and scored on Chester's

single that also sent Elliot to third from where he scored on an error. In the seventh Chester doubled, went to third on an infield out and was balked home to make it 6-2.

Rintoul led off the top of the eighth with a single, was sacrificed to second, went to third on McPhail's single and scored when Preston second baseman Darcy tried to get him at the plate on Elliot's easy grounder not realizing there were two out and he should have gone to first. This made it 7-2. Preston came back to score one in the bottom of the seventh and make it 7-3. Stark beat out an infield hit and was forced to second on a walk. Hamilton then came in to relieve Rintoul and after striking out the first batter he forced walked another to load the bases and then wild pitched in a run.

Campbellville piled up four more in the ninth to complete the scoring. King doubled, went to third on Denis' single and scored as the two of them worked a double steal. Hamilton's double drove in Dennis to make it 9-3 and Denis advanced to third as the shortstop erred on Moore's grounder. Hamilton scored and Moore went to second on a passed ball and then McPhail's double scored Moore to complete the scoring.

Chandler, Gillow, Bester, Renner and Stark all singled. Ralph Rintoul led the Campbellville attack with a double and two singles. Stu King hit two doubles, George Chester and Larry McPhail doubled and singled, Harry Hamilton doubled and Bill Elliot, Bill Dennis and Pete Andrews all singled.

Campbellville visited Oakville last Wednesday night and came out with a big win as Jack Roberts' cooled out the Oaks to the tune of 6-1. The win kept Campbellville in first place in the pennant race that has the first five teams practically tied for the top.

In achieving this big victory Campbellville beat the Oaks in every department. Although each team had six hits two of Oakville's never got out of the infield and were all singles, while half of Campbellville's were home runs. Although John MacKenzie for Oakville struck out ten to Roberts four he also walked four to Roberts one. Oakville committed two errors to Campbellville's one and the Campbellville infield reeled off three double plays.

Campbellville went into a 2-0 lead in the third. Roberts led off with a long home run over the left field fence. Repta then singled, stole second and scored on Moore's single. In the fourth they made it 4-0 as Chester got to second on third baseman Dryden's error and scored ahead of Don Joyce who dropped a home run over the left field fence. Larry McPhail's line drive home run in the sixth made it 5-0.

Oakville scored their only run in the bottom of the sixth. Campbellville got the run back in the top of the seventh when Repta got to second on Dryden's second error, was sacrificed to third and scored on Elliot's single.

MacKay and Hall each had two hits for Oakville and Curtis and Beyers one each. Jack Roberts, Don Joyce and Larry McPhail all homered for Campbellville while Rick Repta, Ken Moore and Bill Elliot all singled.

Campbellville, who had to shuffle the infield around when Earl Cairns' hand was broken a couple of weeks ago had to realign it again as Elmer Dredge tore the ligaments in his leg on Sunday and will be out for three weeks.

This time Stu King went from second to shortstop, Rick Repta from third to second and Ken Moore came in from right field to third.

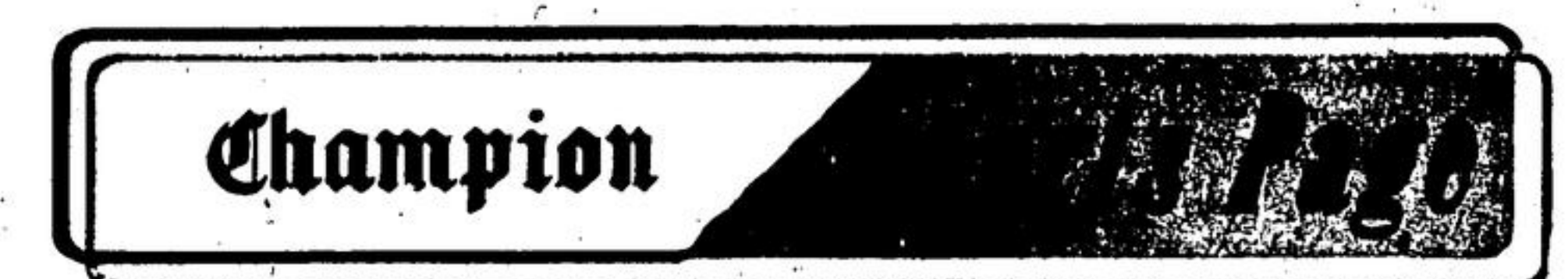
