Money raised in projects

Lions return \$3,000 to town

On July 24, 11 Milton Lions attended the first meeting of the new Board of Directors, under Lion President Sam Nadalin.

Fall plans reviewed included conducting the C.N.I.B. canvass on September 18, to be chaired by Lion Gus Mowbray; an Eve Bank program, chair-

ed by Lion Bob Brown; Centennial Service Club boards at each entrance of the town. Lion Chuck Gervais; Steam Era booth, fall fair booth, joint service clubs meeting, an-1 painting and repairs to the five school bus shelters, built and maintained by Milton Lions.

Club treasurer Lion Joe Wilson reported that club activities in 1966-67, namely Steam Era booth, Fall Fair booth, 200 Club, Fire Fighters Window, Fertilizer sales and Turkey Shoot, had netted the Club approximately \$3,000.

Practically all of the money had been put back into the town and community through the payment of children's dental bills, adoption of a family at Christmas, uniforms for minor ball, school shelters, eye glasses for needy children, a contribution to Lake Joseph Camp for the Blind, High School Bursary, the Canadian Save a Child Fund, furniture for a two-bed room in the new wing of the hospital, cenotaph wreath, crests and attendance pins for a Boy Scout Pack and small miscellaneous donations.

The small reserve is being held for the Club's Centennial Project — a service club sign board at the town's entrances.
