ERIN

Three cadets from the Erin District High School Corps were among a group of cadets selected for Centennial Exchange. Stationed at Ipperwash Army Cadet Camp, Brian Wood on an advance leader course Art Copeland and Casey Vanderbent on a cadet leader course will be on a three week exchange, with headquarters at Farnham, Quebec. During this time, the boys will spend two days at Expo, two in Ottawa, and two in Quebec city. Also attending camp at Ipperwash is Rick Curran on a regular cadet leader course for six weeks, and Martin DeForest on a junior leader course for two weeks.

COMMUNITY Telephone Co., which has 16,000 telephones in various districts of Ontario, and operates the Erin and Hillsburg systems, may soon be owned by a U.S. corporation. Shareholders approved the take-over by Continental Telephone Corp. of St. Louis, Missouri and a hearing on the bid will be held by the Ontario Telephone Services Commission in September. If approved it would be the first time a foreign company has taken over a Canadian telephone system. Community Telephone says it needs about three million dollars to expand services and the sale to Continental at \$22 a share would avoid high financing charges or loans necessary to raise this capital. Last year the telephone commission ordered the company to update telephone service in Glanford and Seneca townships and Caledonia.

BELFOUNTAIN

Construction on the new addition to the Belfountain Area Public School has commenced and should be completed or near completion in time for the fall school term. This will make it an 8-room school making it possible to teach grade 8 which has been transported to Caledon Central School. Donald Graham, Hillsburgh, will continue as principal.

MILTON

For the third time, Premier John Roberts has told Milton Council he is too busy to meet with them regarding their annexation problem. When Council persisted after the second rebuff, the Premier wrote that the Hon. J. W. Spooner, Minister of Municipal Affairs, would meet them August 8 at 2.30 p.m. "The Hon. Mr. Spooner points out, in connection with your request for a meeting, that the Council has already been advised that the decision to postpone a further hearing of the application in question was made by the Ontario Municipal Board on its own responsibility. I regret that, because of the pressure of other business, I will not be able to be present at this meeting," the Premier wrote. Deputy Reeve C. Menly endorsed a three man committee to meet Mr. Spooner and suggested if they had to take him out to lunch, take him. "And if you have to buy a bottle, buy one."

MILTON COUNCIL will not be cutting down elm trees. A by-law proposed to Milton Council recently called for town removal of elms on private or public property to try to minimize the effect of the destructive Dutch Elm disease that is denuding the countryside. Reeve A. Ledwith reported a conversation with a Department of Agriculture representative who suggested the disease had now spread beyond control. "It's too late to control the disease now by cutting them down," he suggested. The reeve also reported the works superintendent's estimate of \$20,000 to remove all the diseased trees in town on public and private property.

OAKVILLE

Pickpockets were active during the three-day Oakville Lions Club carnival at Coronation Park in west Oakville. Oakville police said at least a dozen citizens reported losing their wallets during the weekend. Some were found without their contents. It is estimated the pickpockets stole \$500 during their three-day stay in the town.

Judge will chair conciliation board

Grey County Judge Colin Bennett has been named to chair a conciliation board dealing in the Halton Public Health Nurses dispute with Halton County Council. The lengthy dispute is still dragging on, and negotiations hit a stalemate about six weeks ago. Both the county council and the nurses will have one appointee to the conciliation board.

Dairy farm, Brampton dairy toured by 4-H club members

The Halton and Peel Senior 4-H Dairy and Calf Club members toured the farm of Hartley and J. D. Cameron, and the Flowerlea Co-operative, Brampton, on Thursday, August 3. At the Cameron farm they were given an insight into the present farm operation, and why the farm buildings had recently been modernized. The facilities of the conventional barn proved inadequate about three years ago, and the new single storey dairy barn was built to meet their requirements. The barn went into operation last fall, and has tie-up facilities for 90 head of cattle. A pipe-line milker is used to assist in getting the milk from the cow to the bulk storage tank. The Camerons, who are Guernsey breeders, are on R.O.P. as a method of testing the perform-

ance of their dairy cows. They grow much of the feed consumed by the livestock, and in the future plan to grow their own protein supplement in the form of soya beans. Corn, hay and soya beans would then make up the complete dairy ration, eliminating the grain which is presently being fed. At the Flowerlea Dairy in Brampton Mr. Giner, manager of the dairy co-operative, discussed the operation, mentioning that the dairy was owned by twenty farmers in the Brampton area, nineteen of whom ship their milk to this plant. These nineteen shippers comprise the total fluid milk source of this dairy. After explaining the methods of operation for the plant, Mr. Giner and his plant supervisor divided the group for tours of the entire operation.

Streetsville Jerseys are best in Canada

Glen Arnot Jersey cattle, owned by Delbert Arnot of Streetsville, are the top milk and butter producers in Canada this year, of their class — herds of 10 to 19 cows — the federal government has announced. Mr. Arnot's Jerseys had a breed class average of 294 per cent in milk and butter combined, based on an average of 200 per cent (100 per cent for milk and butter). The Glen Arnot herd has been placed around the top for several years and this year it also took second place for Jersey herds of all sizes in Ontario.

Glenholme Susan Radar - 310778 - Very Good - another Jersey cow in the herd of Murray Mellow & Son, Bolton, Ont., also received a Ton of Gold certificate. In 1398 days she produced 2,000 lbs. fat. She is a daughter of the Superior Sire Brampton Crestian Radar - 125874.

Elemar Claris Radar - 324370 - Very Good - a Jersey cow in the herd of Mrs. F. Eleanor Rob-

inson, Georgetown, Ont., has just been issued a Ton of Gold certificate. In 1461 days she produced 2,155 lbs. fat. She is a daughter of the Superior Sire Sire Brampton Radar - 115389 - and also a winner of a silver medal.

To qualify for this award a cow must produce at least 2,000 lbs. fat in 4 consecutive years.

A second interruption occurred in North Burlington after lightning struck a tree branch which then felled a hydro line. Close to 100 customers in the Guelph Line area, north of No. 5 Side Road, were without power for more than an hour.

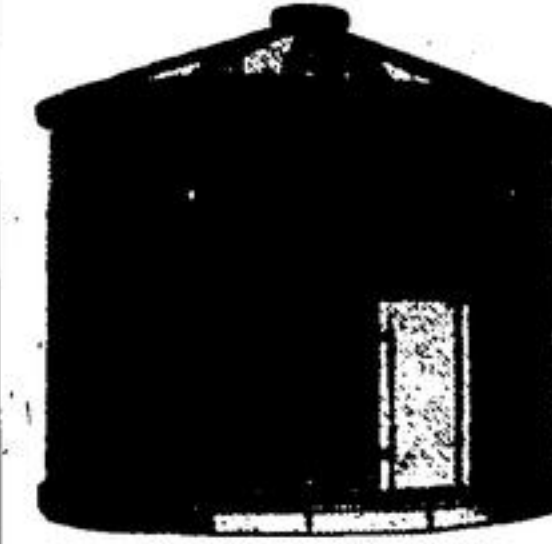
Plastic cans have also been known to become hard and crack in car trunks, due to the heat and action of the gasoline.
