The authority's share will be contributed by the 400,000 restdents of the valley at a rate of about 6 1/4 cents each year for the five-year program.

The executive recommended that expenditures for the fiveyear land acquisition and develcoment program be limited to 31.25 cents per capita or on the average to 6,25 cents per capita a year, spread over the valley's 400,000.
