Need citizens' co-operation for law-abiding town—O.P.P.

The week August 6 to August 12 brings us well into the second half of the summer holiday season and this year included the annual Civic Holiday on August 7. This mid-summer break is traditionally one of the busiest of the year and 1967 was no exception. Acton O.P.P. officers state in their weekly report to the Free Press.

Traffic on our highways, in particular the north country, was estimated to be the heaviest ever experienced, with accidents being reported at a corresponding rate. We of the Acton O.P.P. feel fortunate in any week when no accidents are reported and consequently feel twice as fortunate and greatly pleased to note a complete absence of accidents this week, in Acton.

Unfortunately, other activities, encompassing almost every phase of police work, more than made up for the lack of accidents.

During 192 workhours and 741 patrol miles, the officers of this six man detachment were called upon to investigate one theft, two break and enter complaints, two disturbances and 12 other occurrences. Three liquor seizures were made, resulting in a like number of charges being laid pursuant to Liquor Control Act of Ontario.

Traffic patrols incurred produced five citations to erring motorists, while 28 others were given the opportunity of a second chance, for offences they had committed.

Magistrate's Court in Milton was not in operation on August 7, as court officials too enjoyed the holiday weekend.

A Police Officer is seldom given the opportunity to speak his mind, with regards to his profession, to the public, the police say. Perhaps this column gives the chance to "speak out", thereby helping through a more understanding public.

A Police Constable, particularly in a small community like Acton, is called upon to act in every situation imaginable. He attempts to pacify warring families, he tries to ensure the steady flow of traffic along our streets, he tries to determine the identity of thieves and vandals and many, many more law violat-

ors. Often, the local constabulary is called upon to quell a disturbance of fight in a restaurant or other public place, and often, too, upon arrival at the scene of the occurrence, the parties responsible have fled the area. The police must now carry out an investigation into the complaint in order to determine the participants. And yet it is amazing when as many as a dozen people and more witnessed the disturbance, that no one can recall what took place, or who was involved. Someone complained, but who? The constant repetition of this type of action becomes most frustrating, but becomes even more frustrating the following day when we hear people remarking that the Police did nothing about the disturbance last night. How can we take action in a matter we did not see and can learn nothing about? You say you don't want to get involved? Well, you must if we are to have a law abiding town. We will do our best to control any situation we are confronted with, but are powerless in some matters, unless your co-operation is forthcoming.
