The week August 6 to August 12 brings us well into the second half of the summer holiday season and this year included the annual Civic Holiday on August 7. This mid-summer break is tradionally one of the busiest of the year and 1967 was no exception, Acton O.P.P. officers state in their weekly report to the Free Press.

Traffic on our highways, in particular the north country, was estimated to be the heaviest ever experienced, with accidents being reported at a corresponding rate: We of the Acton O.P.P. feel fortunate in any week when no accidents are reported and consequently feel twice as fortunate and greatly pleased to note a complete absence of accidents this week, in Acton.

Unfortunately, other activities, encompassing almost every phase of police work, more than made up for the lack of accidents.

During 192 workhours and 741 patrol miles, the officers of this six man detachment were called upon to investigate one theft, two break and enter complaints, two disturbances and 12 other occurrences. Three liquor seizures were made, resulting in a like number of charges being laid persuant to Liquor Control Act of Ontario.

Traffic patrols incurred produced five citations to erring motoriests, while 28 others were given the opportunity of a second chance, for offences they had committed.
