Eight high school students who attended summer school in Brampton during their holidays have all passed their subjects. As a result, three more students will receive grade 12 diplomas this fall. Others will now pass on with the other students in

their grade. This is the first time Acton students have had the opportunity to make up their marks during the summer. Principal Ted Hansen said that in the spring, when marks were given out, there. were 17 names specified of students who could benefit from the summer school program. Of these, nine agreed to pay the required \$30 and register; one later dropped out for reasons of

bealth. The school ran from July 3 to August 11, ending with the exams. Altogether there were 370 students attending summer school at Central Peel Secondary School. in Brampton. Students came from all over the area, including

54 from Georgetown. This school had no drop-outs, no truants, and no apathy in the eyes of either teacher or student, since everyone was there simply because they want to improve

themselves. There were three types of courses offered, enrichment, improvement, and make-up (not the cosmetic type, but the making up

of lost subjects). In the make-up section the opportunity was given to take two subjects they missed with the mark they receive at summer school replacing the mark on the June report. Only applicants who attained at least 40% in the failed subject, and with an overall average of no less than 50%,
