Town, county council reps at Port Arthur convention

The unusually large total of 140 resolutions were discussed and duly dealt with at the 69th annual convention of the Ontario Municipal Association. The four day meeting was held in Port Arthur, and those from Acton who flew to attend were Mayor Les Doby and his wife, Reeve H.H. Hinton, Deputy-Reeve Dr. Frank Oakes and Mrs. Oakes, clerk-administrator Jack McGeachle and Mrs. McGeachle.

Mayor Doby, as new president of the town and village section, didn't have much spare time to spend with the rest of the Acton group. He was automatically on the executive of the O.M.A., and attended many sessions with the resolutions committee. He was at meetings all day long, he explained.

He also had a special duty on the program - to introduce R.P. Milligan, chairman of the Ontario Police Commission, who spoke on "The Administration of Justice and the Police Act".

There are 976 municipalities which are members of the O.M.A. and there were 1,000 people at this convention. Mr. Doby has been attending them for six years. His first was the town and village section convention in Ajax in 1960 - and, co-incidentally,

Spontaneous combustion is believed to have caused a fire which destroyed a big barn at the home of Wilfred Leslie, R. 4, Georgetown, last week. Only the smouldering rubble, twin silos and the foundation shell are left.

Built in 1913 it was one of the show places of the area.

Mr. Leslie reported that despite the loss of the barn, milking machinery and a large amount of hay, firefighters were able to save a milk storage tank valued at several thousand dollars.

Georgetown fire department fought the blaze, but the fire was well underway upon their arrival. Loss is estimated at over \$50,000.

new legislation regarding the storage of rubbish on property and control of litter; seeking reduction of municipal tax from income tax.

General resolutions which were of particular interest to Mayor Doby and the Acton group were early announcement of approval of winter works programs; elimination of sales tax on building materials in view of the increasing cost of homes; regulation to cover disposal of bottles (yes, it's a real problem, they learned); use of reflecting license plates; regulations requiring inspecting of amusement park equipment, and seeking an alternative method of issuing motor vehicle licenses.

Purpose of the O.M.A. convention, Mr. Doby explained, is to gather together leading elected representatives and appointed officials from both urban and rural municipalities for one of the province's most important conventions dealing in matters of local government concern.

The O.M.A., a voluntary organization of municipalities, was established in 1899 and is the oldest and most widely representative body of municipal people in the province.

Resolutions concerning administration brought requests for amendments to the drainage act; request for new legislation concerning boards and commissions and how they are formed; seek

of the 140 resolutions dealt with, Mr. Doby felt some were especially important. Many resolutions discussed concerned education. There is pressure to obtain at least 80 per cent of education costs from senior levels of government. Compulsory driver education was supported.

Planning was another important field. There were many recommendations for amendments, and the government was asked to set up a complete review of planning.

In welfare, senior government was asked to consider at least 80 per cent of cost of hospital construction; 80 per cent of foster day care programs, and to provide dental care and dentures for welfare cases.
