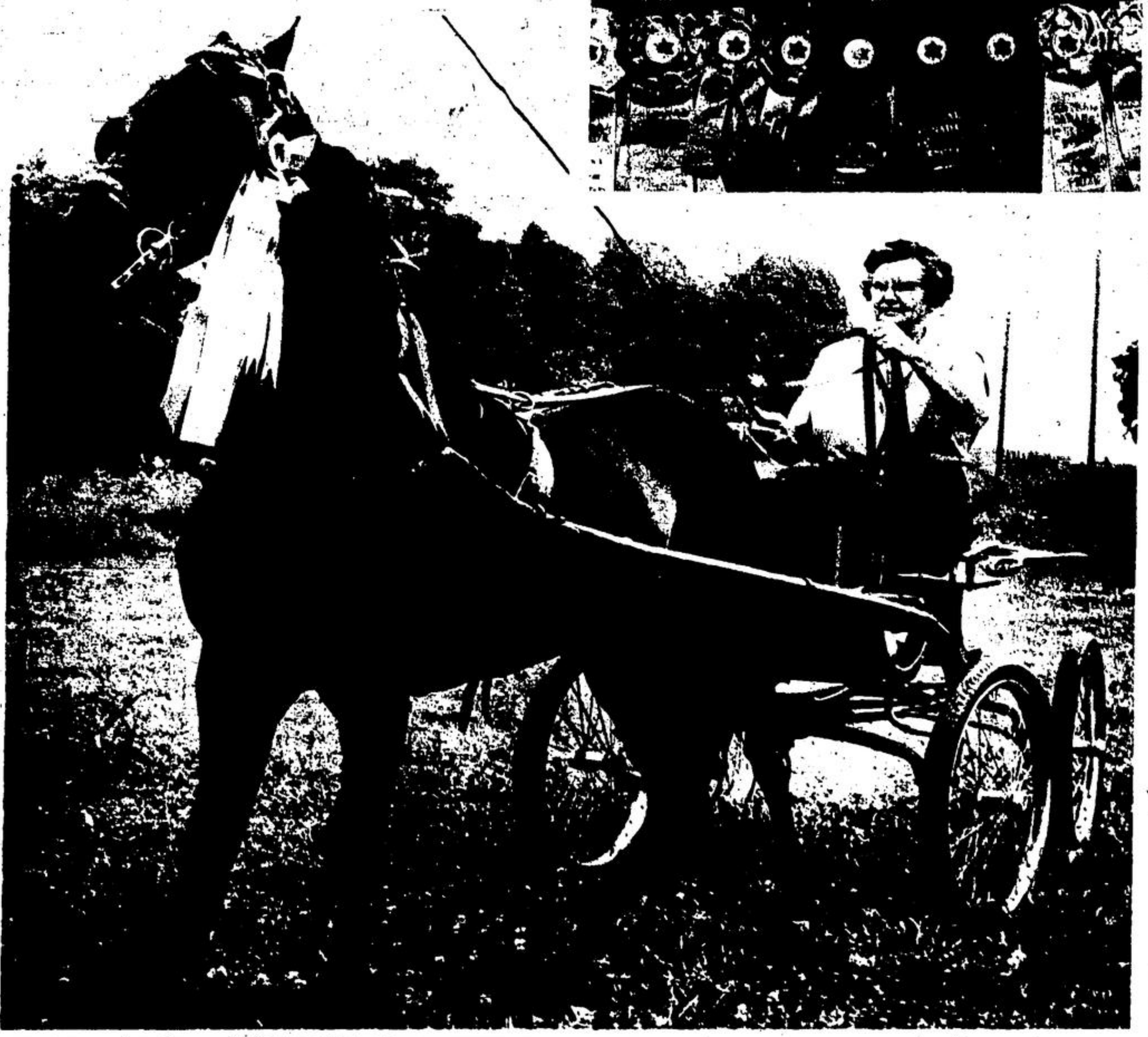
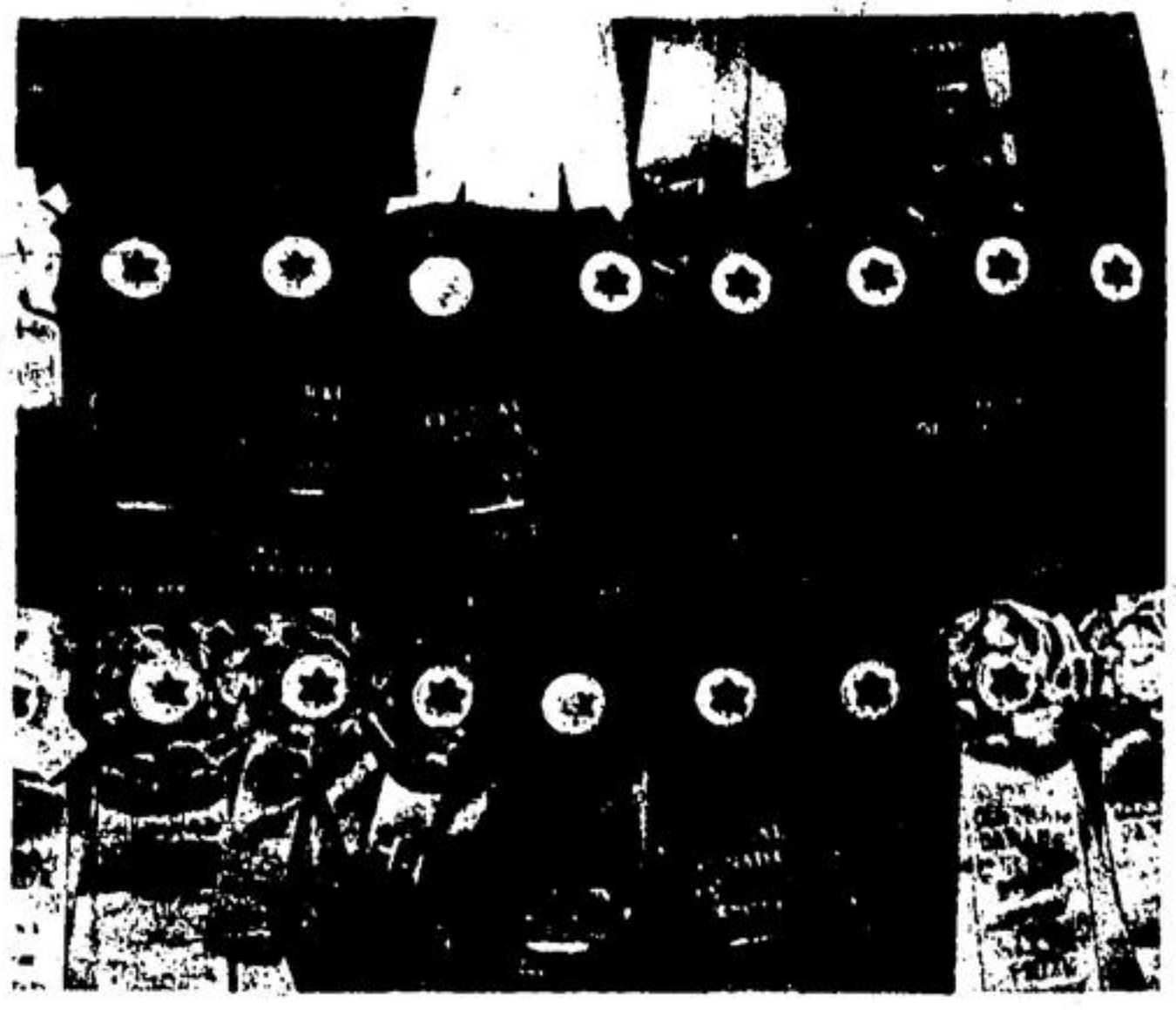

## Expanded three-day fair has unique centennial theme

The three-day fair with its special centennial theme is lined up and ready for staging by the fair board.

Former Actonians will receive invitations back for the event-packed weekend of September 15 to 17.

The Citizen of the Year, George Musselle, will officially open the centennial fair during the Friday evening show in the com-

community centre. Miss Centennial Queen will be selected by judges and crowned that evening, eliminating the previous judging event of past years. Centennial costumes, both old and new, will be judged. Acton Legion Chorallers will present a half-hour concert and Acton Citizens' Band will play.

Vince Mountford has a program of "Variety All-Stars" including seven special acts.

For the first time, a Friday afternoon school children's pageant will bring all the boys and girls into the park from Acton, Limehouse, Brookville and Spey-side schools. There will be a program of singing drills and gymnastics, which the teachers concerned agreed upon in June. Out-of-town scholars will come in by school bus to participate in the pageant, scheduled from 2 to 4 in the afternoon.

The centennial parade Saturday afternoon will feature the Acton band, Guelph Junior Optimists Band and special floats, with prizes for the best.

In the morning Saturday there are the Junior Horse Show and pony line classes at the fair grounds in the park.

The afternoon sees the livestock show, baby show, entertainment by Vince Mountford, commercial displays and hall exhibits. Families in centennial costume will be awarded prizes.

Acton Square Dancers will perform, and the Guelph Junior Optimists Band will present their drill.

The monthly meeting of the Halton Farm and Home Electric Club was held on August 15 in the Ontario Department of Agriculture Office, Milton. Nell Robertson, Club President, opened the meeting with 4-H Club Pledge.

The meeting was turned over to Bill Cook from Ontario Hydro who briefly reviewed the year's work.

All members then wrote a 35-minute test and it was taken up. Murray McGuinnis outlined the upcoming achievement day for the Electric Club. Club members must give a short speech on their project for the year. All parents and interested friends are invited to the September Achievement meeting to be held at the Bayne Community Centre.

The final meeting of all Ontario Electric clubs will take place on Oct. 28, at 10:45 a.m. This meeting consists of a tour of the Sir Adam Bock generating station, Niagara Falls and a banquet in the evening.

### Another phony \$5 passed at Raceway

During the week of August 20 to 26 inclusive, personnel of Milton Detachment Ontario Provincial Police worked a total of 759 1/4 hours and patrolled 6,899 miles on area highways. As a result of patrol 44 charges were preferred, 37 traffic warnings were issued, and 27 vehicles were safely checked. There were 56 convictions registered in Magistrate's Court.

There were two property damage accidents investigated as well as one personal injury accident resulting in two persons being injured. Total property damage as a result of these accidents was approximately \$1,560. Causes of accidents were, inattentive driving, driver lost control, and speed too fast for road or traffic conditions. There was one charge laid under the Highway Traffic Act as a result of these accidents.

There were 41 general occurrences during this period including two minor thefts and the theft of a power saw in Esquesing Twp.; one person arrested and charged with abduction; one person charged with impaired driving, two liquor investigations resulting in five persons being charged under the Liquor Control Act; one assault occurring in Norval, being investigated; one stolen auto from Metro Toronto recovered in Nassagaweya Twp.; completely stripped; one counterfeit \$5 bill passed at Mohawk Raceway; one premise found insecure at night. All other occurrences were of a minor nature.

special classroom has been prepared, and the library upstairs to revert to a regular classroom.

New storage is arranged under the stairs; floors are tiled, the staff room is renovated, a new door installed. Pete Turkosz has been working there most of the summer, with caretakers following up with painting and varnishing.
