Fastest mile in North America this season was paced by Romulus Hanover in the \$50,000 centennial pace at Blue Bonnets Raceway in Montreal this week.

The three-year-old colt took a full second off the track and Canadian record with a rapid time of 1:57 1/5. With the exception of Dancing David, who broke stride, the seven finishers were all timed under 1:59. Seventh place finisher Golden Blend finished in 1:58 4/5.

The record crowd-27,040 fans - came to see Romulus Hanover. He took the lead early and had the race in control all the way. Owned by Farmstead Acres of Glen Head, N.Y., Romubus Hanover was the 2-5 choice. The colt had won 11 of 13 races this year prior to the centennial. His \$25,000 winner's share of the purse pushed his season's earnings to \$220,224.




