Staff of 26 at high school

The high school, expecting 450 students Tuesday, has a staff of 25 with principal Ted Hansen. Several teachers are new to Acton but just one has no previous teaching experience.

Mrs. J. Hallman B.A., B.L.Sc., comes from Central Peel Secondary School and will teach English and look after the library. She and her husband live on the fourth line of Esquesing.

Mrs. D. Hunter B.A., Sc., taught at Fenelon Falls and was for the past year dietitian at Homewood in Guelph. She will teach home economics. She lives in Guelph.

R.N. Laughlin B.A. lives in Lakeview subdivision, and comes here from Belleville (Quilts S.S.) after 12 years. He will teach mathematics. He was a member of the grade 13 marking committee this summer.

H. Swallow B.A. from Westminster Secondary school, London, will be the head of the history department. Mr. and Mrs. Swallow also live in Lakeview subdivision.

Brent Turnbull B.A. graduated from the University of Western Ontario, took a summer course and will teach junior science.

Mr. Hansen expects the new winter holiday will have definite advantages.

This is the first year the four and five year streams extend through all the grades, with the four year business and commerce course now in grade 12, taking the place of the "special commercial" in grade 12.

The six-day cycle of classes, instituted last fall, is being continued. Text books in grades nine to 12 are all supplied.

Commencement is November 3. The date is set early to assure the presence of the speaker Rev. J.C. Bothwell of Burlington.

The high school is almost filled to capacity. Mr. Hansen says, although more students could be accommodated in many classes. Variety of choice results in smaller classes but a regular classroom is still required.

It's expected the regular three buses will be able to handle their usual country routes. About 35 to 40 grade nine students will be added to the routes, minus the graduates, numbering slightly less.

During the summer the science department set up a new agricultural room.

School secretaries are again Mrs. Lauder and Mrs. Pendleton. Bill Middleton is no longer secretary-treasurer of the high school board. Fred Salt has taken over the post, and has been working with the transportation committee of the board on the bus routes.

Teach German to children

Among those returning to classrooms and school books next week, are the students of a different type of school -- the German-Canadian Club of Halton County's German language school which operates one evening a week in the Pine St. Union Hall in Milton.

Two teachers have been engaged to tutor students in the German language. Over 20 from North Halton attended the courses last year, most of them children, but adults are welcome too. This year's course will be the fifth annual.

Local organizers are Rudy Arbelber and Fritz Schicht of Milton and Dieter Geissler of Acton.

Christian school enrolment increase

A fifth classroom will be in use when the Christian school in Esquesing township re-opens in September. Enrolment has increased to 165 from 128 last September. There are now about 40 Acton children attending the school, most of them of Dutch descent.

Religious instruction is included in the curriculum. J. Petrusma of Georgetown is principal.

School for Deaf expects 450

The School for the Deaf at Milton opens on Thursday of next week, with an expected enrolment of 450 - 55 up from last year - including the first graduates who next spring will go out into the business world.

A new teacher is Mrs. Eleanor McKeown, wife of Ralph McKeown principal of Glen Williams school, who will be an academic as well as elementary home economics teacher.

There are now three teachers on home visitors to aid deaf children. For the first time, various students who are taking vocational training will be assigned to local industries part-time.

Winter term dates changed

The school year will be changed this year, and the "long haul" from Christmas to Easter will be established at a certain number of weeks, rather than depending on the Easter holiday for the end of the term.

The school year can be better planned with the new system, going into effect all over Ontario for the first time.

The fall term lasts from Sept. 5 to December 22. The winter term - the changed one - is from Jan. 3 to March 15. The spring term is from Mar. 25 to June 28. Christmas holidays remain the same, lasting from Dec. 23 to Jan. 2.

The winter holiday (formerly the Easter holiday) is from Mar. 16 to Mar. 24. Then at Easter time the pupils have Good Friday and Easter Monday off.

The new system has just about the same number of days - 78 in the first term, 53 in the second and 67 in the third.

The long stretch of winter waiting for a holiday always seemed by far the longest in the past. Now pupils as well as teachers and parents, won't have to wait so long for a break in the school routine.
