In the aftermath of storm, works superintendent Bruce McKerr told Council he had started to check manholes in problem areas since the heavy storm flow always washes debris in. Among the items retrieved from manholes were bricks, baseballs, hockey sticks and one two-by-four, six feet long.

Ross Smyth, national vice-president of World Federalists of Canada and an officer of the Canadian United Nations Association. described the historic movement by the Dundas Town Council to a congress plenary session attended by 500 delegates. His announcement was greeted by applause from the 200 strong Japanese delegation, who represented 250 mundialized towns and cities with fifty million inhabitants.
